## Yankton's Diekmann To Enter Grinnell Hall Of Fame

GRINNELL, Iowa — Former Yankton High School standout Steve Diekmann is one of 12 individuals named to the 2014 class of the Grinnell College Athlete Hall of Fame.

Diekmann was a two-time All-American and two-time Academic All-American for Grinnell, helping lay the foundation for some of the program's success. He averaged 34.4 points per game and shot 50 percent from the field in the 1993-94 season, helping the squad compile its first winning season in nearly 30 years, earning the Midwest Conference South Division Co-Player of the Year. As a senior, he averaged a NCAA Division III record 37.3 points per game.

Diekmann graduated from Grinnell with a degree in economics and later earned an M.B.A. from the University of Chicago. He had a 15-year career in the financial markets (most recently as a managing director at Nomura Securities) and now works as a director for The Leaven, a nonprofit organization. Diekmann lives in Alamo, Calif., with his wife Julie and their two children, Matthew and Hope.

His love for basketball remains strong. He plays when he can, including through a prison ministry with inmates at San Quentin State Prison, and has attended multiple men's basketball reunions.

A ceremony, slated for Saturday, Aug. 30, at 10 a.m. in the Charles Benson Bear '39 Recreation and Athletic Center Natatorium, is free and open to the public. A dinner for the inductees and their families is scheduled for that evening.

## Coyotes Picked First, Second In Summit League XC Poll

ELMHURST, Ill. — The University of South Dakota women's cross country team was chosen co-favorites for the 2014 Summit League season by a poll of the league's coaches.

USD and South Dakota State each received 43 points, with USD taking three first place votes and SDSU 2. North Dakota State, which finished a close third with 42 points, took the other three first-place votes.

SDSU held a 34-31 edge in the men's cross country poll, with the Jackrabbits getting four first-place votes and USD two. IUPUI, which finished third at 27 points, received the other first place vote.

The NDSU women and SDSU men won the Summit League a year ago.

USD begins its 2014 campaign on Aug. 29 at the Bison Invitational in Fargo, N.D. Start time is 5 p.m.

campuses. Mothers Against Drunk Driving national president Jan Withers said her organization opposes any alcohol in a college environment because most of the students are under 21.

"Kids are watching adults all the time," Withers said. "If they see the only way to have fun is to drink a lot, then they're going to model after that. That's not the message we want to be sending to them."

SMU reported no change in crowd behavior after alcohol was introduced at basketball games last season but saw huge gains in attendance. The average of 5,653 — the highest since 1984-85 — was up 64 percent over 2012-13.

SMU student body president Ramon Trespalacios

said having beer available could help boost football attendance, too. The Mustangs drew an average of 18,724 to their 32,000-seat stadium last season, a drop of 12 percent from 2012 and the lowest since 2008.

"Sometimes if you wanted to go to a game and were used to drinking beer, people chose to go to a bar instead of the venue," said Trespalacios, a 22-year-old graduate student. "It's good to bring everyone together and enjoy the same environment."

Still, just a handful of college stadiums are giving students and fans the chance to buy a brew. Most remain opposed to it. The Southeastern Conference and the 23-school California State University system, for example, have policies banning alcohol from general seating areas.

"I know why the question is relevant for some," said Nebraska athletic director Shawn Eichorst. "For me, the bottom line does matter. But

at what point does it outweigh what you're trying to do, trying to keep the civility?"

Safeguards are used in an effort to keep drinking under control. A fan who wants to drink must obtain and wear a wristband indicating he or she is at least 21. Fans are limited to buying two beers at a time, and sales are cut off at halftime or in the third quarter.

Using an oft-repeated sports marketing catchphrase, Akron athletic director Tom Wistrick said offering beer is a way to "enhance the fan experience."

"You do it because, yeah, we want to make some money on it," Wistrick said. "But in this day and age, we're going to fight the 60-inch high-def TV since every game is available on an ESPN broadcast or on the high-quality Internet. How do we keep people coming to the stadium for the in-stadium experience?"

## Vikings Adding \$19M To Stadium Project

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — The Minnesota Vikings are kicking in another \$19.7 million for their new stadium to make sure it has the features they want.

Rising steel prices and refined cost estimates for the stadium's massive pivoting glass doors created a budget shortfall and left the Vikings with a choice: Scrap certain features to cut costs or increase their share of the project.

Steve Poppen, the Vikings' chief financial officer, said scaling back stadium design was "never an option." The Minnesota Sports Facilities Authority, the board overseeing stadium construction, approved the increased spending Friday.

"Our goal has always been

to have the best game day experience, for our fans and for all Minnesotans who come to visit this stadium," Poppen said.

The new stadium is due to open in 2016. The Vikings are playing outdoors at the University of Minnesota until then.

Combined with tapping a \$26.4 million contingency fund and previous additions for larger video boards and more televisions and escalators, the Vikings have added \$49 million to the project over the past year. Their contribution now stands at \$525.6 million, a little more than half the \$1.023 billion project, with taxpayers covering the rest.

Facilities authority chairwoman Michelle Kelm-Helgen said much of the cost increase

was due to incomplete estimates on how much certain parts of the project would cost, like the elaborate glass doors at the stadium's west end, ductwork in the upper sections and an internal system that will deliver beer kegs to concession stands throughout the stadium.

Kelm-Helgen said she's confident the board won't face any more budget gaps.

The Vikings and the stadium authority also announced that SMG has signed a 10-year deal to market and operate the stadium. SMG already runs NFL stadiums in Chicago, New Orleans, Houston and Jacksonville, and its facilities have hosted nine Super Bowls. Minneapolis is due to host the 2018 Super Bowl.
