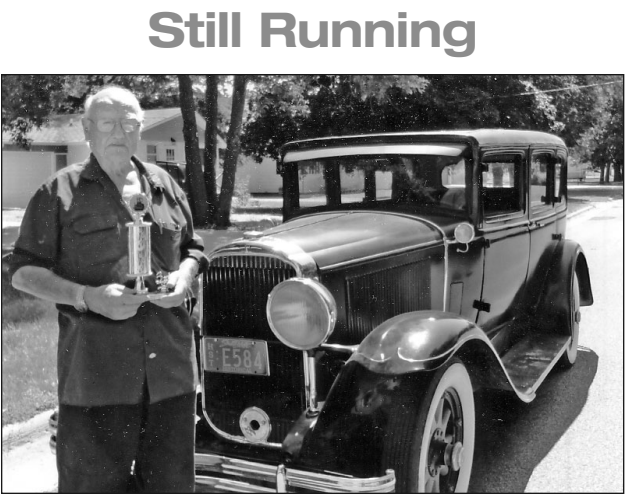

Lake Andes Man Sentenced For Sexual Abuse Of A Child

LAKE ANDES — A Lake Andes man has been sentenced to 30 years in custody and five years of supervised release for his conviction of aggravated sexual abuse of a child.

Sylvan Godfrey, 51, was sentenced Aug. 11 by U.S. District Judge Roberto A. Lange, according to U.S. Attorney Brendan Johnson.

At some point between May 2006 and November 2007, Godfrey sexually abused a girl who was younger than age 12, according to the news release.

Besides his prison time and supervised release, Godfrey was also ordered to pay a \$100 special assessment to the Federal Crime Victims Fund.

Godfrey was indicted by a federal grand jury on July 17, 2013. He was found guilty May 28 of the charge of aggravated sexual abuse of a child as the result of a federal jury trial in Pierre.

The case was investigated by the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI).

Assistant U.S. Attorney Timothy M. Maher prosecuted the case.

Godfrey was immediately turned over to the custody of the U.S. Marshal's Service.
