USD will receive \$525,000 for the trip and for the experience of walking out on the Autzen Stadium field and lining up against one of the premier programs in the country. This isn't one of those games where an FCS team goes into a guarantee game with a realistic chance to win. This isn't Minnesota. This isn't North Dakota State playing Colorado State. This is Oregon. This is the big leagues. And to document the action, I will be making the trip to Eugene. This is a trip you simply can't miss. When the school you cover plays such a game, you need to be there. And that was my mindset. Stay tuned for plenty of coverage this week.

Offensively the Coyotes haven't been shy having shot no less than 21 attempts at the opposition's goal in these two matches this weekend and last week's exhibition.
