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Scheduling FBS Games Requires Right 'Fit'

Scheduling a game against a Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) program can prove to be a balancing act between money, regional exposure and yes, a reasonable chance to win.

Both Division I schools in South Dakota, though, are taking their teams to the highest of high level college football. One — South Dakota State opens its season Saturday in a regional location (Missouri), while the other, University of South Dakota, visits Eugene, Oregon, to face a top-5 program.

Finalizing any FBS game, regardless of how good the team is, isn't exactly the easiest thing to do, according to USD athletic director David Herbster.

"As much as we're looking for them, they're looking for games with us, as well," Herbster said. Ideally, USD and SDSU would prefer to play regional games in which its fans can easily attend the game, and where the respective universities traditionally recruit, anyway.

"It comes down to a fit," Herbster said.

In the case of the Oregon contract, secured nearly two years ago, the potential money was too much to pass up, Herbster said — particularly for an athletic department with a budget near \$12 million.

"Oregon was an opportunity at the time," Herbster said. "For the dollar amount we got, it made a lot of sense.

"We do some recruiting on the west coast, but we wanted to give our players an unbelieveable experience."


And so, the Coyotes will take the field at Autzen Stadium against a Ducks team picked anywhere between No. 3 and No. 5 in various national polls. Missouri, meanwhile, was tabbed No. 24 in the preseason Associated Press poll.

Since becoming a D-I counter in 2010, USD has played the likes of Central Florida, Minnesota, Air Force, Wisconsin, Northwestern and Kansas. South Dakota State, meanwhile, has since 2008 played Iowa State, Minnesota, Nebraska (twice), Illinois and Kansas.

The Jackrabbits have really tried to zero in on the Midwest for those guarantee games, according to head coach John Stiegelmeier. He called it a "winwin" for the program and for its fans.

"We don't schedule them to see where we get to go," Stiegelmeier said. "We want to keep them within the region so people recognize the name and are able to get there.

With their whole squad returning back from last season, the Mount Marty Lancers men's soccer program is looking to make the Great Plains Athletic Conference playoffs for the first time.

"For the first time, we have 17 returning players," Mount Marty head coach Nathan Epp said. "That's a very nice situation to be in. They have all been here and know what to expect. Even though we still have more underclassmen, the level of understanding is way ahead of where we were last year."

The Lancers went 4-14 (0-10 in GPAC) last season. Even though their record didn't show, Epp feels his team got better from the previous season.

"We were much improved," he said. "We didn't really have the depth we would like to see or to be consistently competitive. We lost two guys and didn't have the talent level to fill in those positions."

In the offseason, the Lancers worked very hard to change the script from a year ago.

"The guys came in good shape," Epp said. "We don't do a lot here, because they're from all over, but they stayed
