

WALL ST. RECAP

The Standard & Poor's 500 index closed above 2,000 points for the first time Tuesday. Financial markets moved higher after some encouraging news, including a surge in consumer confidence. The Dow Jones industrial average is about 32 points below the record close it set on July 16, while the Nasdaq remains well below its dot-com era high of 5,048.62 set in March 2000.

 The Dow Jones industrial average rose 29.83 points, or 0.2 percent, to 17,106.70.
 The Standard & Poor's 500 index rose 2.10 points, or 0.1 percent, to close at 2,000.02.

The Nasdaq composite rose 13.29 points, or 0.3 percent, to 4,570.64.

CHICAGO (AP) — Grain futures were mostly lower Tuesday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for Dec delivery rose 2 cents to \$5.5650 a bushel; Dec corn was 2.50 cents lower at 3.65 a bushel; Dec oats were down 6.75 cents to \$3.4475 a bushel; while Nov soybeans fell 1.25 cents to \$10.28 a bushel.

Beef and pork were higher on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. Oct live cattle rose .10 cent to \$1.4825 a pound; Oct feeder cattle was .72 cent higher at \$2.1247 a pound; while Oct lean hogs gain 1.65 cents to \$9.9510 a pound.

Got Pheasants? Pick Your Spots To Hunt This Fall

State wildlife biologists and conservation officers spotted more pheasants along roads in every region of South Dakota during the annual route surveys conducted from July 25 through August 15 this year than they did in 2013.

However, just a handful of the regions — Sisseton, Sioux Falls and Yankton — showed more birds per mile this summer than in 2012.

Here are snapshots of GFP found in each region during the 2014 brood routes, grouped by our subjective adjectives of solid, decent and so-so.

SOLID:

- Chamberlain (Brule, Buffalo, Charles Mix north, Gregory north, Lyman, Tripp north and Aurora counties) — The 10 routes averaged 6.55 pheasants per mile, up from last year's 2.66 and below the 10-year average of 14.38.
- Pierre — (Hughes, Jones, Lyman, Potter south, Stanley, Hyde-Hand south and Sully counties) — The 12 routes averaged 5.20 pheasants per mile, up from last year's 2.15 and below the 10-year average of 9.16.
- Mobridge — (Campbell, Corson, Dewey, Potter north and central, and Walworth counties) — The eight routes averaged 3.59 pheasants per mile, up from last year's 2.12 and below the 10-year average of 6.88.
- Mitchell — (Davison, Hanson, Charles Mix central, Douglas, Aurora, Hutchinson north and west, Jerauld, McCook, Miner and Sanborn counties) — The 16 routes averaged 3.04 pheasants per mile, up from last year's 2.00 and below the 10-year average of 5.97.
- Aberdeen — (Brown,

Marshall, Day, Edmunds, Faulk, Spink north and central, and McPherson counties) — The 14 routes averaged 2.74 pheasants per mile, up from last year's 1.70 and below the 10-year average of 6.11.

- Huron — (Hand north and central, Beadle, Jerauld, Kingsbury, Sanborn, Miner, Clark south, and Spink south and central counties) — The 17 routes averaged 2.92 pheasants per mile, up from last year's 2.04 and below the 10-year average of 7.32.

SO-SO:

- Yankton — (Yankton, Charles Mix south, Bon Homme, Clay, Turner-Hutchinson west and south, and Union counties) — The 10 routes averaged 1.36 pheasants per mile, up from last year's 0.68 and below the 10-year average of 1.40.
- Brookings — (Brookings, Deuel south, Hamlin south and central, Kingsbury, Lake north and Moody counties) — The 11 routes averaged 1.16 pheasants per mile, up from last year's 0.77 and below the 10-year average of 3.89.
- Watertown — (Codington, Clark, Deuel, Grant and Hamlin counties) — The 12 routes averaged 1.21 pheasants per mile, up from last year's 0.77 and below the 10-year average of 4.63.
- Sioux Falls — (Minnehaha, Turner-Hutchinson north, Lake, Lincoln, McCook and Moody counties) — The 13 routes averaged 1.06 pheasants per mile, up from last year's 0.90 and below the 10-year average of 2.14.
- Sisseton — (Grant, Day north, Marshall and Roberts counties) — The five routes averaged 0.77 pheasants per mile, up from last year's 0.56 and below the 10-year average of 1.94.
- Western — (Bennett, Haakon, Perkins, Butte and Fall River counties) — While generally not pheasant territory, there are pockets. The five routes averaged 1.53 pheasants per mile, up from last year's 1.01 and below the 10-year average of 2.68.
