The field project, which is named for long-time Lancers baseball coach and Yankton baseball supporter, Bob Tereshinski, has a goal of placing artificial turf on the infield of the current Yankton Riverside Field.

The Benedictine Service Grants are awarded by the Sisters of Sacred Heart Monastery. These funds are intended for projects that are above and beyond the regular workings of Mount Marty College and are innovative and progressive, as well as mission and service

oriented. In addition, the grant projects must aid in the educational, health, and social service needs of the people.

In October of 2013, Mount Marty College and the Yankton Baseball Association began work to seek approval and funding for the Riverside Baseball Stadium Turf Project. The MMC Lancers baseball team plays their entire home schedule at the newly renovated stadium in addition to all the games played by the Yankton Baseball Association — those games together total more than 200 games. The need for permanent turf is a major piece of the puzzle.

The Tereshinski Field project will be split into two phases. Phase one will involve installing artificial turf on the infield portion of the field. Phase two will involve raising the funds to install artificial turf on the remaining portions of the field. The total project cost of phase one is estimated at nearly \$230,000 and phase two is \$296,000 with a total project cost of approximately \$526,000.

grievance procedure to appeal his termination to the city manager," he said. "Yet he failed to follow the next step of the procedure and appeal the city manager's decision to the Department of Labor and Regulation. Therefore, Kolda failed to exhaust his administrative remedies, and the circuit court lacked jurisdiction to resolve Kolda's claims."

As a result, the Supreme Court reversed the lower court's decision.

"We reverse the circuit court's denial of the City's motions for judgment as a matter of law on the issue of exhaustion of administrative remedies," Zinter wrote.

"This matter is remanded to the circuit court to vacate the award of pre-hearing due process damages. Because Kolda's failure to exhaust his administrative remedies is dispositive, we do not address the other issues raised on appeal."


