Ducking Taxes? Don't Blame Burger King

NEWSDAY (Aug. 27): Burger King, corporate deserter? That's what President Barack Obama would call the fast-food giant now that it's buying Tim Hortons Inc., the Canadian coffee and doughnut chain.

But the epithet is hard to swallow.

The \$11.4-billion deal announced Tuesday will allow the Miamibased Burger King Worldwide Inc. to slash its United States tax bill by moving its corporate home to a foreign country, a strategy known as inversion. At least 21 companies have announced or completed such deals since the beginning of 2012, according to Bloomberg News. Obama castigated them last month for doing business as usual in the United States while renouncing their citizenship to avoid taxes.

He's wrong to vilify corporations for legally reducing their tax

Corporations exist to make money. Their executives have a fiduciary duty to shareholders to maximize profits. Rather than trying to shame them, the United States can slow inversions by reforming the U.S. tax code to make the strategy less appealing.

The top federal corporate tax rate in the United States is 35 percent. That's among the highest in the world, although many corporations actually pay much less and those most successful at exploiting loopholes pay zero. In Canada the top federal tax rate is

Congress should tilt the playing field in our favor. Eliminating the corporate tax would be the best approach, as long as reformers also scrap the lower rate for capital gains and dividends, and tax that income the same as income from work. Cutting the corporate tax rate while closing loopholes would work, too, or enacting a territorial system in which only profits earned in the United States would be taxed by the United States.

Of course, any of that would require Congress to take on contentious tax reform, something it hasn't had the courage to tackle. Until it does, the message to corporations like Burger King is, have it your way.

Today's Highlight in History: On August 28, 1964, two days of race-related rioting erupted in North Philadelphia over a false rumor that white police officers had beaten to death a pregnant black woman.

On this date: In 1609, English sea explorer Henry Hudson and his ship, the Half Moon, reached present-

day Delaware Bay. In 1862, the Second Battle of Bull Run (also known as Second Manassas) began in Prince William County, Virginia, during the Civil War; the result was a Confederate victory.

In 1922, the first-ever radio commercial aired on station WEAF in New York City; the 10-minute advertisement was for the Queensboro Realty Co., which had paid a fee of \$100.

In 1944, during World War II, German forces in Toulon and Marseille, France, surrendered to Allied troops. In 1945, the Allies began occupy

ing Japan at the end of World War II. In 1955, Emmett Till, a black teenager from Chicago, was abducted from his uncle's home in Money, Mississippi, by two white men after he had supposedly whistled at a white woman; he was found brutally slain three days later.

In 1963, more than 200,000 people listened as the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. delivered his "I Have a Dream" speech in front of the Lincoln Memo-

rial in Washington D.C. In 1968, police and anti-war demonstrators clashed in the streets of Chicago as the Democratic National Convention nominated Hubert

H. Humphrey for president.
In 1972, Mark Spitz of the United States won the first two of his seven gold medals at the Munich Olympics, finishing first in the 200-meter butterfly and anchoring the 400-meter freestyle relay. The Soviet women gymnasts won the team all-around.

In 1988, 70 people were killed when three Italian stunt planes collided during an air show at the U.S. Air Base in Ramstein, West Germany. In 1990, an F5 tornado struck the

Chicago area, killing 29 people. In 2012, former Massachusetts Gov. Mitt Romney swept to the Republican presidential nomination at a storm-delayed national convention in

Ten years ago: Islamic militants claiming to be holding two French journalists in Iraq gave France 48 hours to overturn its law banning the wearing of Islamic head scarves in schools. (The French government re-

fused the demand; the reporters Christian Chesnot and Georges Malbrunot, were released in December 2004.) The U.S. men's basketball team beat Lithuania 104-96 to win the Olympic bronze medal in Athens; Argentina won the gold medal by beating Italy 84-69.

Five years ago: The Los Angeles County coroner's office announced that Michael Jackson's death was a homicide caused primarily by the powerful anesthetic propofol and another sedative, lorazepam. Celebrity disc jockey Adam Goldstein, known as DJ AM, was found dead in his New York apartment; he was 36.

One year ago: A military jury sentenced Maj. Nidal Hasan to death for the 2009 shooting rampage at Fort Hood that claimed 13 lives. On the 50th anniversary of Martin Luther King Jr.'s "I Have a Dream" speech at the Lincoln Memorial, President Barack Obama stood on the same steps as he challenged new generations to seize the cause of racial equality.



A Painful Minimum Wage

The Bureau of Labor Statistics reports that 1.5 million hourly wage workers reported earning the minimum wage and another 1.8 million earned less than the minimum wage, meaning they were legally excluded from the minimum wage or were illegally underpaid.

Those numbers are not the total of people earning less than the minimum wage because they don't include salaried workers earning less than the minimum wage.

According to the August issue of In These Times: "Workers at Target, Walmart and McDonald's need food William stamps to survive ... Walmart is the **KERR** country's biggest beneficiary of Food Stamp dollars, and many of those dollars come from its own workers." (My wife responds, "I will not shop at Walmart. If I want something and only Walmart has it, I'll go without!) Walmart's total take of food stamps is \$13.5 billion annually. That is 18 percent of the

total annual distribution of food stamps in our

"So what?" you might respond. The "what" is that most of their employees are the people who must use the various helping programs paid for by our state and federal taxes in order to survive. That group is made up of workers averaging 35 years of age, 80 percent of which are 20 years old or older, 56 percent of whom are women of whom 28 percent have children, according to the Economic Policy Institute. On average, these workers bring in half of their families' income. And, who provides that other half? Those of us who pay the state and federal taxes that supply the money for "Medicaid, The School Breakfast Program, the School Lunch Program, the Section 8 housing program, the Earned Income tax, Low Income Home Energy Assistance, and the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program," says In These Times.

So, raising the minimum wage would reduce

more than 400 organizations that advocates progressive tax reform, released a study in April that concluded that Walmart alone costs taxpayers \$6.2 billion annually in public assistance. That report draws from a 2013 study by the Democratic

staff of the U.S. House Committee on Education and the Workforce, which estimated that Walmart cost taxpayers, on average, between \$3,015 and \$5,815 per worker per year. Does that sound like a real bonus for the Walton family (among the richest billionaires in our country) by keeping their 20,997 employees low paid, and getting us taxpayers to pay the extra salary (via the above program services) they need to survive? And, as long as we allow this situation to exist, the Walton family just keeps getting richer. How about that for a record-breaking example of exploitive greed that beats all? And our elected members of Congress, backed by the rich and our Supreme Court, are directly responsible.

To change that, we'll need to elect some new senators and representatives who want to see the minimum wage increased to where it should be, according to the original regulations, which have been violated since 1968 by our Congress. That increase will also boost our economy, when those millions now barely surviving can again spend more money it will help us all.

But we in South Dakota don't even have to wait for the Congress to act. We can petition our state Legislature to raise the minimum wage in South Dakota and vote for candidates who will promise to vote for such a raise. And remember, we have the power of the ballet box to do it, IF enough of us want it done and vote for those who will do it! (By the way, there is also an initiative on South Dakota's November ballot to raise the minimum wage.)

So. I for one will be anxious to see what your answer is when the votes are counted and we see who is elected and later how they act toward raising the minimum wage.

If we don't help elect candidates who are sympathetic to the one-third of us all who are living at or near poverty while the rest of us pay for near half of the income of those who are working at these low-paying but profit reaping companies, don't complain to me about the shape our country is in.
