






Yankton's Forecast

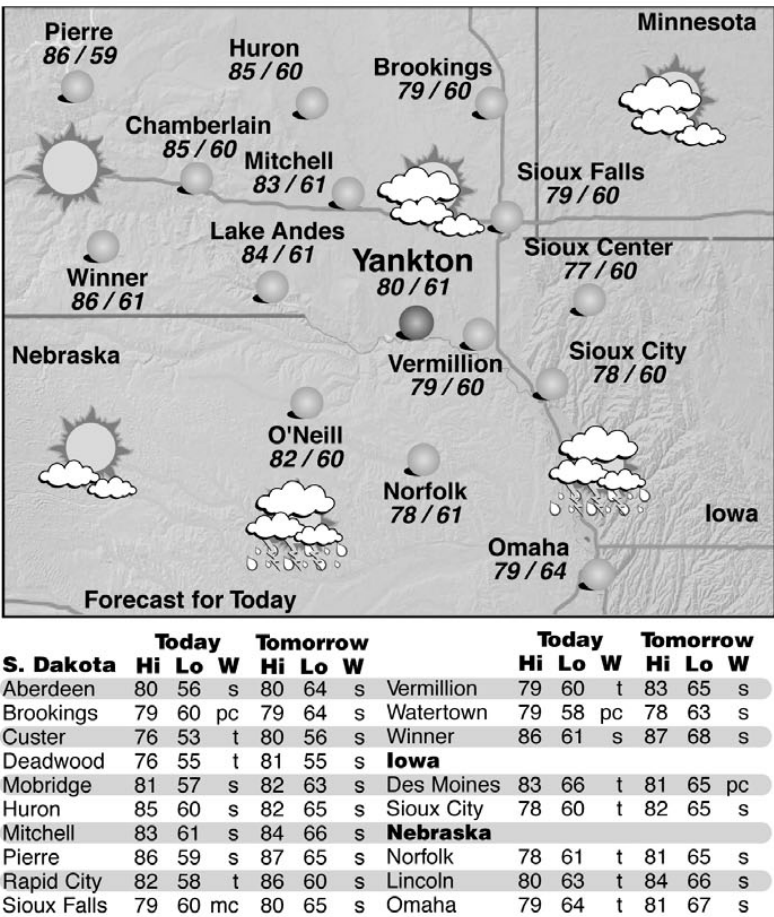

Household Hazardous Waste Collection Event Set

Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) Collection will be held on Friday, Sept. 12, for Vermillion residents and Saturday, Sept. 13, in Yankton. There is a \$10 fee per vehicle to help defray the collection cost.

This collection provides opportunities for residents to safely dispose of products containing harmful chemicals. Unless used and disposed of according to directions, these household chemicals present a threat to the environment. Special handling is required to dispose of them properly. Materials collected are recycled, or disposed in hazardous waste landfills or incinerators. A licensed private company under contract to the Missouri Valley Recycling Center provides these services.

Examples of Household Hazardous Waste include:

- Cleaning Supplies — Room deodorizers, oven cleaner; sanitizer; drain cleaners; toilet bowl cleaners; NiCad batteries; floor polish; silver and metal polishes; nail polish; furniture polish; mothballs; floor wax; disinfectants; powdered bleach.
- Household Products — Florescent bulbs; mercury switches and thermometers; bug sprays; Flea collars; perox-

ides; and medicines.

- Shop, Hobby Area and Repair Supplies — Latex paint; oil based paint; used oil; used anti freeze; cleaners, thinners and solvents; lubricants, glues and adhesives; stains, strippers and preservatives; lead acid batteries; oil filters; and containers with unknown substances.
- Yard, Garden and Farm Supply — Pesticides, herbicides and other products.

The South Dakota Department of Agriculture will be on site to receive farm products.

Why should you check your household products and clean your house of unusable, unwanted Household Hazardous Waste?

Certain types of HHW have the potential to cause physical injury to sanitation workers, contaminate septic tanks or wastewater treatment systems if poured down drains or toilets, and present hazards to children and pets if left around the house. Read product labels for disposal directions to reduce the risk of products exploding, igniting, leaking, mixing with other chemicals, or posing other hazards on the way to a disposal facility. Even empty containers of HHW can pose hazards because of the

residual chemicals that might remain.

YOU CAN HELP REDUCE HHW DISPOSAL COSTS

In 2013, Missouri River Recycling paid over \$20,000 to dispose of HHW received from residents. Although proper disposal of HHW is important, it is even more important to avoid purchasing hazardous items and substitute them with non-hazardous alternatives.

The more you use safe alternatives, the less we spend on disposal of HHW. The more HHW you dispose of, the less we save during these tough budgetary times. Choosing safer alternatives is the difference between money saved and money spent.

So ask yourself, "Why unnecessarily buy something that is harmful and expensive to dispose of when you could choose an alternative that's safer and cheaper to manage?"

You can help reduce the cost of this program by:

- Avoid purchasing hazardous household materials
- Using up what you buy
- Giving away what you cannot use

- Using safer alternatives

On Saturday, Sept. 13, the collection event will be held from 9 a.m.-1 p.m. at Yankton Transfer & Recycling Center, 23rd and Kellen Gross Dr., Yankton.

Bridge Inspection Dates Released

Here are the upcoming inspection dates for the Jim River Bridges in Yankton County.

- Sept.22 — The Jim River Bridge on 431st Ave. (Menno Road) will be closed due to biannual inspection.
- Sept.23 — The Jim River Bridge on 436th Ave. (Jamesville Colony Road) will be closed due to biannual inspection.
- Sept.24 — The Jim River Bridge on 306th St. (Volin Road or Johnson Hill) will be closed due to biannual inspection.
- Sept.25 — The Jim River Bridge on 309th St. (Old Highway 50 or Flegg's Bridge) will be closed due to biannual inspection.

Inspection are to take place between the hours of 8 a.m.-5 p.m. It is not anticipated the inspections will fill up this whole time frame but it will give the Engineers ample time to perform the work if the time is needed.

Each closure is tentatively planned, but may change due to the weather.

Sandbar Spraying To Begin In September

PICKSTOWN — During September, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers will spray sandbars in the Missouri River between Pickstown and Ponca, Neb. with aquatic-approved herbicides to keep the sandbars clear of vegetation. This work is being done so that the sandbars may be used by the endangered interior least tern and threatened piping plover for nesting.

Spraying will begin after Labor Day and will be conducted only on vegetated portions of the sandbars. Approximately 100 acres have been identified for treatment in 2014 by a team of federal and state representatives. Spraying will be done with glyphosate and imazapyr, both approved for aquatic use by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. By removing vegetation from the sandbars, they remain viable nesting habitat for the terns and plovers.

Spraying will take place only when environmental conditions allow, such as little to no wind and no rainfall in the immediate forecast. All spraying will be done by certified applicators using all-terrain vehicles. While efforts will be made to conduct spraying during the week, when public use is lower, spraying may occur on weekends since good spraying days can be limited due to wind or rain.

The Corps began current vegetation control and removal activities on selected sandbars in 2012 and will continue each spring and/or fall, as needed, into the future.

In 2000, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service issued a Biological Opinion (BiOp) in which the agency found the Corps' operations on the Missouri River would not likely jeopardize endangered interior least tern and threatened piping plover populations if certain recommendations were implemented. One of those recommendations is to restore emergent sandbar habitat as nesting habitat for these two species. After public review of a draft environmental assessment, the "Final Environmental Assessment and Finding of No Significant Impact for Restoration of Emergent Sandbar Habitat Complexes in the Missouri River, Nebraska and South Dakota" was released in May 2013.
