Bucks Look To Improve On 5-5 Finish

The Yankton Bucks football team is looking to rebound from a 5-5 record last season, that saw them bounced 32-14 in the semifinals to Watertown.

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Mason Strahl said. "It hasn't sat with me very well. We have had a long time to prepare ourselves for the season and the opener at Mitchell. The turning point for last season, was when Yankton lost to Aberdeen. Likness decided to turn away from the power-run game, which has been a staple in Buck football for decades.

"I wasn't happy with the point production," he said. We lost a few games and after getting beat by Aberdeen Central, I knew we had to change our offense. It worked out, we were able to throw the ball around and really saw some numbers we haven't seen around here.'

Some of those numbers were led by all-state and alltime leading receiver, J.J. Henja, who had 1,205 yards receiving and 10 touchdowns last season. He posted 1,659 yards with 93 catches during his career.

'There is really no replacing a guy like Hejna," Strahl said. "Whenever we needed a play, he delivered for us. But. we have guys like Matt Fitzgerald, Evan Greeneway, Brady Hale, Charlie Stephenson, the list goes on and on with our play-makers. We are going to need everyone to contribute to have a successful passing attack this fall."

Strahl also had a record of his own: The single season

ankton quarterback Mason Strahl had his ups and downs last vear. He learned as he went and figured out what it takes to play consistently at

the varsity level. The beginning of the season was pretty shaky for me, he said. "I thought I was ready, but the varsity level is a whole different ballgame. I was able to watch how Michael Rucker did things, and he did it the right way. But, as the season went along, I thought the team and I got a lot better and were one of the better teams in the state. J.J Hejna helped me out a lot; he was one of the best players in this area last fall.'

Yankton head coach Arlin Likness stuck to his guns when Strahl struggled early, which paid off in the long haul.

"As the season went on last year, he got better and confident," he said. "All of our quarterbacks were young, which means this season, we will be able to execute better.'

Last season, the Bucks were defeated by Watertown, in which they committed five turnovers, in the semi-finals. Strahl has that game in the back of his head as motivation for this upcoming season.


