Motorcycle Accident Results In Injuries

VERMILLION – A motorcycle crash Saturday afternoon resulted in non-life threatening injuries to the driver and passenger.

The Vermillion troopers from the South Dakota Highway Patrol responded to the crash about 4 miles south of the Vermillion exit on Interstate 29.

The rear tire of a 2010 Harley Davidson blew out causing the driver to lose control. The motorcycle and trailer combination began to swerve back and forth throwing the driver and passenger off. The motorcycle came to rest on the shoulder of the road.

Single Vehicle Crash Injures Two

A single vehicle crash Friday night on Highway 50 near Yankton has resulted in two injuries, according to the South Dakota Highway Patrol (SDHP).

The crash occurred about six miles west of Yankton, according to Yankton deputy fire chief Larry Nickles.

Troopers from the Vermillion squad responded to the crash, the SDHP said.

The driver of a Ford Explorer lost control of her vehicle. The vehicle entered the south ditch striking a delineator post, a culvert, a driveway approach, an electric junction box, and telephone box before coming to rest on its side.

None of the five occupants were wearing a seat belt. A front seat passenger and rear seat passenger were transported to a local hospital for treatment. The Yankton County Sheriff's Department, the Yankton Fire Department and the Yankton EMS assisted.

of days. Then we went to Kansas for our actual anniversary, but we were still here for part of Achievement Days.

To mark their 35th anniversary, the Pajls placed an advertisement in the Press & Dakotan, encouraging the public to attend Achievement Days and wish the Pajls a happy anniversary.

More than a few people saw the ad and took the Pajls up on the offer.

"I just wanted to come over and wish you a happy anniversary," one woman told the couple. "I didn't realize it was your 35th until I saw the ad in the paper."

Perhaps surprisingly, the Pajls didn't come from a 4-H background.

"Martha and I never did 4-H (growing up)," Jim said. "We learned from scratch – and we learned and learned."

"And we're still learning," Martha said with a laugh.

GETTING A START IN 4-H

The Pajls met and married while attending Kansas State University in Manhattan, Kansas. He completed veterinary school, and she studied fashion design in the home economics department.

They moved to Yankton in April 1984 where Jim began his veterinary practice. The couple started working with 4-H in 1993.

All four of their children participated in 4-H while growing up. Today, Elizabeth is 32 years old, Matthew 31, Joseph 27 and Jackie 18. The 4-H connection continues, as the three youngest siblings attended this year's Achievement Days.

"Jackie is our youngest one, and this is her last year in 4-H," Martha said, noting the end of an era.

However, the Pajls have made their mark during the past quarter-century. They started the Yankton Clovers 4-H Club in 1993, and the group remains in existence.

In addition, Jim served as leader of the Shooting Sports 4-H Club.

"Our three younger kids were all in Shooting Sports. We teach them things like archery, pistols, BB guns and rifles. It's been around for a while," Jim said. "At one point, it became a regular club. Before, it was considered a specialty club."

The Pajls have worked

with more than one 4-H club at a time, which can be challenging but rewarding, Jim said. "We were double clubbed for quite a while. Some people do it with several kids," he said.

During his time as a club leader, Jim also served as president of the Yankton County Extension Board for six years.

For good measure, he helped 4-Hers with completing health sheets for both large and small animal exhibits. "And I judged cats," he said with a smile.

Besides helping run the Yankton Clovers 4-H Club, Martha worked behind the scenes at Achievement Days and other 4-H functions.

Jackie showed a picture of her poultry and described its qualities during this year's Achievement Days. Jim noted a trend toward fewer Achievement Days exhibits. He pointed to a number of factors, such as fewer 4-Hers, fewer young people on the farm, fewer livestock exhibits and more specialty events – such as horse and dog shows – at other times during the summer.

However, 4-Hers are still producing quality work in a wide variety of project areas and still learning many valuable lessons, the Pajls said.

Regardless of the project, Jim said the emphasis remained on allowing their children to learn skills on their own. "We let the kids do their projects with minor assistance," Jim said.

4-H remains a unique program because of its focus on hands-on learning with involvement by the entire family, Martha said.

The Pajl children competed in a wide range of projects reflecting their various personalities and interests, their parents said.

"With our two boys both in horticulture, we did the Farmer's Market because they had so much produce that we had to get rid of it," Martha said, her eyes widening at the memory of the bountiful gardens.

Other competition areas included livestock, rabbits, photography, special foods, nutrition and wellness, arts and crafts, fashion review and public speaking.

The 4-H lessons carried over into everyday life, Jackie said. "When we were making something to eat, my mom would say, 'Is this 4-H quality food?'" she said.

The rabbit competition at the South Dakota State Fair produced some memorable moments, Martha said.

"The kids and I went to the state fair with the rab-

bits," she said. "We couldn't get a (motel) room in Huron, so we slept in the car and then showered on the fairgrounds."

The Pajls made it to the rabbit competition. Afterwards, they took in the fair for the rest of the day, Martha said. "It was a lot of good memories," she added.

Elizabeth added a title to her set of memories, as she was crowned Miss South Dakota State Fair in 2003.

The 4-H competition requires the ability to go with the flow. 4-H officials adjusted this year's Achievement Days schedule when the avian flu forced cancellation of live poultry shows in South Dakota. As a result, Jackie showed a picture of her poultry and described its qualities during this year's Achievement Days.

"You grow in different areas, and you're exposed to other life skills," Martha said. "You carry through with projects, and it enhances your entire life."

Jackie pointed to the friendships and work ethic she has gained through 4-H.

Jim noted the leadership skills and work ethic cultivated through 4-H which benefits members later in life.

"A lot of (4-Hers) have moved on to higher positions (in their chosen professions) because they have a lot of those qualities," he said. "I would definitely recommend 4-H."
