

Iraqi Minority Group Set To March

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — An Iraqi minority group with strong ties to Lincoln is set to march to the Nebraska Capitol to mark the anniversary of attacks by Islamic State militants. Organizers say the group will convene at 23rd and O Streets in Lincoln at 10 a.m. on Monday, and will then march to the Capitol and back. The march will commemorate the Yazidis who suffered and died in last year's massacre in northern Iraq. Lincoln has the largest concentration of Yazidis in the United States, with many coming to America after serving as translators for U.S. forces during the first Gulf War. The Yazidis staged a rally outside the governor's residence last year to call attention to the casualties in Iraq and plead for humanitarian assistance.

Nonprofit Buys 2 Historic Movie Theaters

Death Penalty Group 'Cautiously Optimistic' About Signatures

LINCOLN, Neb. — Organizers of a campaign to reinstate Nebraska's death penalty say they're cautiously optimistic that they'll gather enough signatures to place the issue on the 2016 ballot, triggering a showdown with opponents who pledge to wage a strong campaign of their own. Nebraskans for the Death Penalty has less than a month remaining to gather about 58,000 signatures before the Aug. 27 submission deadline. The group was launched on June 1, with heavy financial backing from Gov. Pete Ricketts and his father, TD Ameritrade founder Joe Ricketts. "I don't want to discount the sheer

magnitude of what it takes to get out and collect signatures, but it has gone well," said Chris Peterson, a spokesman for Nebraskans for the Death Penalty. "We're cautiously optimistic that we're going to be successful." Peterson declined to release the specific number collected but said the campaign has received signatures from all counties except Sioux County in northwestern Nebraska. Peterson said the campaign has relied on several hundred petition circulators, both paid and volunteer. The volunteers include the parents of Andrea Kruger, one of four people fatally shot by Nikko Jenkins in Omaha in 2013, and Vivian Tuttle, whose daughter Evonne Tuttle was murdered during a botched 2002 bank robbery in Norfolk.

Lincoln Strategy Group, an Arizona consultant hired by the group, is managing the campaign's paid circulators. If the measure reaches the ballot, voters could repeal a law approved by the Legislature in May, when senators overrode Ricketts' veto by the narrowest possible margin. Nebraska was the first traditionally conservative state to abolish the death penalty since North Dakota in 1973. To prevent the law from going into effect before the 2016 election, Nebraskans for the Death Penalty would have to collect about 115,000 signatures. In either case, the signatures must come from at least 5 percent of the registered

Roy was born December 15, 1932 on the Anderson homestead in Turner County to Fred and Lizzie (Wenzlaf) Anderson. At the age of 12, the family moved to their farm west of Irene. He was baptized and confirmed on July 21, 1946 at Bethlehem Lutheran Church near Midway. Roy attended country school and then graduated from Irene High School in 1950. He then worked at Freeman Company in Yankton building airplane parts. He also drove truck, did bridge construction on Hwy 46 and

helped his dad farm. Roy was drafted into the US Army on May 19, 1953 and was stationed at Fort Leonard Wood, MO. He was then shipped to RAF Molesworth-Hunts in England rebuilding bomb damaged runways. Roy was a heavy equipment operator in "B" company, 801st Engineer Aviation Battalion. He earned the National Defense Service Medal and the Engineer Battalion Medal for his service. He also had the opportunity to visit Germany, Sweden, Austria, Italy, Denmark, France, Amsterdam, Holland and Switzerland. At the end of his service, Roy was stationed in Fort Sheridan, IL and was honorably discharged at the rank of Corporal First Class on April 27, 1955. On returning to South Dakota, he farmed with his dad and brother until his marriage to Lois Mae

Frohreich on May 11, 1956 at Martinus Lutheran Church in rural Utica. Roy and Lois farmed rented land until they purchased the family farm in 1958. They farmed together for many years until health problems required him to slow down. They moved into Yankton on May 1, 1987 and Roy continued to farm with his son, Rod, until he had two severe strokes in November 2007. After many months of healing and therapy, Lois decided to move him home and give him a lot of tender, loving care with the help of some very special care givers. Roy enjoyed sitting in his sunroom watching the birds and squirrels. He also enjoyed watching the Minnesota Twins and Vikings. Roy loved the Lord, his faithful wife Lois of nearly 60 years, his family, RED tractors, music, the land, fishing, hunting and telling

stories. In the last few years, he also loved and enjoyed his seven great grandchildren. Roy was a faithful member of St. John's Lutheran Church and continued attending even in his wheelchair. Michael's dedication to reporting and writing was, in large part, due to his love of people. And that especially meant family. He married Carol Lintner on April 16, 1999, in Sioux Falls, S.D. A devoted husband, Michael also loved his family and his in-laws and had a special place in his heart for his nieces and nephews.
