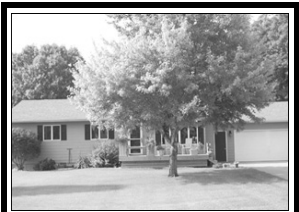

Activities Center.  
“We encourage people to register prior to the event,” Grotenhuis said. “If someone can’t get the form in, they can certainly show up the day of at their timeslot. The more, the merrier.”

This year will technically be the department’s third annual event. Last year’s Duathlon had to be canceled due to weather restrictions, so this will be the second time the event has taken place. The first year, the event had more than 30 participants. This year, organizers are hoping to have even more.

“We are trying to highlight some of the great things about Yankton like Riverside Park and the Meridian Bridge while also promoting physical activity,” Grotenhuis said.

The events will consist of both biking and running. The groups will be divided into three separate age ranges, each assigned different distances. The groups will begin at the following times:

- 9 a.m. - Boys and Girls 6-8 Years
- 9:15 a.m. - Boys and Girls 9-11 Years
- 9:45 a.m. - Boys and Girls 12-15 Years

“It’s not the true distances of the triathlon,” Grotenhuis said. “We are just trying to get them out there and get an introduction of the two events.”

The biking portion will be first across the Meridian Bridge, followed by the running event through Riverside Park. The younger age groups will be traveling the shortest distances and the distances will increase with the age ranges:

- Ages 6-8: Biking – 1.2 miles or 1 lap (across the bottom, back across the top)
- Ages 9-11: Biking – 2.4 miles or 2 laps
- Ages 12-15: Biking – 3.6 miles or 3 laps

“Somebody doing this might be encouraged to take on this activity for the rest of their life,” Grotenhuis said. “Being active young adults will hopefully lead them into being future active adults.”

The next portion will be the running. Once the kids have come down the ramp of the top portion of the bridge,

said the increased numbers of people and heavier traffic come with, “unfortunately, the possibility of more accidents.”

Traffic fatalities tied to the Sturgis rally grew to nine on Tuesday, compared with three during roughly the same time period in 2014.

Bret Brower, who has been in five rallies, said he saw an injured rider when he was traveling to the nearby Black Hills town of Deadwood. The 57-year-old from Ellensburg, Washington, said he’s been more careful this year when riding, “especially when you see somebody sprawled out on the highway.”

sobriety meetings, they’ve all obtained employment, they’ve paid restitution, they’ve performed countless hours of community service in this community and they have, of course, attended the mandatory court sessions in this room with myself.”

Bern said the graduates have put in a lot of work in their treatment time.

“These four graduates have accumulated over 2,300 days of sobriety,” she said.

“They’ve attended over 1,000 support group meetings, which here can be (Narcotics Anonymous) or (Alcoholics Anonymous) or other group meetings, they’ve attended over 1,000 and, in fact, one of our graduates has started their own group which is very successful in Yankton County. These graduates have paid almost \$10,000 in fines and restitution to the state of South Dakota. After they’ve completed their probation, which they will, there will be 29 years of prison that will not be served.”

She added the lack of prison time served ultimately benefits South Dakotans as well.

“If those terms were served in their entirety, that will have (cost) the taxpayers of South Dakota over \$600,000,” she said. “If

they will carry their bikes back to the parking lot west of the Water Treatment Plant and begin running through the designated areas of Riverside Park:

- Ages 6-8: Running – one-fourth of a mile
- Ages 9-11: Running – three-fourths of a mile
- Ages 12-15: Running – 1 mile

“We will have markers up for the kids and we will also have people stationed, just so they know where to go,” Grotenhuis said.

The Department of Parks and Recreation’s purpose of the event is to support physical activity in a fun way and not necessarily in a competitive way. As a result, sponsors will not be giving medals or prizes for the winners. Kids can enjoy the fun of biking and running with each other without the pressure of competition.

Because this Duathlon is for the purposes of fun, kids can stop at any time. They can rest or even walk the remainder of the distance if they wish.

“The main thing is just for them to try and accomplish the event,” Grotenhuis said. “Last time that we did it, even with the young ages, everyone finished the running event.”

In the future, representatives from the Parks Department may even incorporate swimming into this event, making it a triathlon for kids. If this happened, the department would attempt to utilize facilities such as the Summit Center or Memorial Park pools.

“We are always looking to improve the event, so we will take feedback and see what we might adjust for the following year,” Grotenhuis said.

Parking can be found in the Capitol building parking lot located at Douglas and Levee streets. Participants will walk their bikes to the parking lot west of the Water Treatment Plant and walk their bikes to the bridge by their designated time slot.

“It’s a fun event for everyone,” Grotenhuis said. “We want them to get out and be active while enjoying some of the benefits of living in Yankton.”

Patrol said Wednesday that authorities have so far seized over \$10,000 more in cash compared with last year’s rally. There have also been 17 more felony drug arrests and over 200 more citations compared with last year.

South Dakota Attorney General Marty Jackley, whose office includes the state Division of Criminal Investigation, said the traffic fatalities and the implications of the felony drug busts have been concerning. But Jackley, who praised a strong working relationship between local, state and federal law enforcement officials, said the rally has been pretty nonviolent so far.

Rusty Mitchell, a 57-year-old from Fallbrook California, said he hasn’t seen much rowdiness or fighting.

“These are basically good, working class people out here

for a good time,” Mitchell said as he pointed up the line of bikes parked into the distance.

Brower, who said he planned to leave early because the rally had become “a little bit too much,” said he has talked to a lot of first-time attendees who came for “the big granddaddy” 75th anniversary.

Tim Swezy, who was polishing his Yamaha Warrior on Main Street in Sturgis, said the anniversary is part of the reason he decided to attend this year — that, and it’s been “on the bucket list.”

The 56-year-old Illinois resident, who also explored the Black Hills area for a few days with his wife, Sandy, said he hasn’t had a bored moment.

“I’ll probably come back on the 80th,” Tim Swezy said. “I’ve got a lot of things to see.”

even only a quarter of those sentences were served, that will still save South Dakota taxpayers \$170,000. Not only has this program saved lives — which is the most important thing — but it’s saved a lot of money too.”

Bern said the most important thing is helping people get their lives back on track.

“Obviously, our biggest goal is to get these people their lives back,” she said. “In fact, they’ve given themselves their own lives back.”

David E. Gilbertson, chief justice of the South Dakota Supreme Court, also spoke to graduates Wednesday.

Gilbertson said he recognizes the decision all the graduates have made on their futures.

“Graduates, today we honor not what you did, but what you’ve become,” Gilbertson said. “You came to a fork in the road in your lives. Before coming to this court, you had to make a decision — do you go into this program or do you go to the pen?”

He said these four graduates now have all the power to decide on the next step in life as a result of sticking with the program.

“You now have the skills to go wherever you want to go, whether it’s college or a job,” he said. “You’re free to go about the country and find your way.”

Following Gilbertson’s address, all four graduates were presented with com-

memorative diplomas and a chance to give their own remarks. The graduates — three men and one woman — spoke of the struggles that had brought them there, the challenge of the drug court program and their aspirations for the future.

Dr. Tom Stanage of Lewis & Clark Behavioral Health, part of the Yankton Drug Court Team, told the *Press & Dakotan* it’s fulfilling to see people graduate drug court and he sees a bright future for the program.

“It’s great just to see people’s lives transformed,” Stanage said. “Drug court’s been one of the most successful programs I’ve been involved in. Just absolutely a wonderful program. ... It’s certainly grown in the past two years and it will continue to grow.”

Gilbertson told the *Press & Dakotan* that drug courts help give addicts a way to escape addiction.

“I think it’s a win-win deal for everybody,” he said. “I’ve never talked with a drug court graduate yet that said they were happy with their life as an addict. They said they secretly hated it, but couldn’t rid themselves of the addiction on their own. This gives them the tools to rid themselves of that addiction and to basically go and do what they want to do with their life in a sober manner.”
