The powwow is a celebration of the tribe's culture, heritage and traditions. The event will feature a variety of dancers, drum groups and vendors. Admission to all events is free, and the powwow is open to

The powwow holds great meaning for those in attendance, Teboe said.

This is a place where people come together to visit, laugh and share a meal. They rekindle old friendships," he said. "In the past, the powwow would have occurred in connection with an event. The tribe could have come back and celebrated a successful

This weekend's powwow actually starts at 5 p.m. Friday with the color run at the grounds. The event provides a wellness activity and raises awareness about diabetes, which strikes a large number of American Indians.

In addition, the tribe will formally dedicate the Ponca Educational Trail at 10 a.m. Saturday. The trail is located on the powwow grounds,

south of Niobrara State Park. The ¾-mile limestone trail includes interpretive signage about the Ponca people and the history of the tribe, native plants, an amphitheater, earth lodge and buffalo overlook.

The construction (of the trail) was finished in April, but the grand opening will be held Saturday," Teboe said. "The interpretive signage tells you about the interconnectedness between Mother Earth and the animals, and how we (tribal members) used the area back

in the day."

The Poncas decided to wait with the trail's grand opening ceremony for a couple of reasons, said tribal spokesman Brett Ellis.

Workers have continued with improvements throughout the summer, with the native plants coming into good form, he said.

"If someone gives you an eagle feather, it's a sign of high respect. You have done something good, or you have made an accomplishment," he said. "The other part represents the eagle as the highest flying bird. It carries our prayers and our communication to the Creator."

Powwows are important because they provide the opportunity to share such traditions with both Native American and non-Native people, Teboe said.

All people are welcome and encouraged to attend the powwow, he said.

"It's meant to serve as an annual gathering and celebration of families and friends, he said.

In doing so, his pursuit for human rights set the standard for all civil rights leaders to follow. His words, "I am a man; God made us both" still resonate today for those who face injustice and persecution.
