Out Of Storage

Mothballed L&C Exhibit Makes Move To Mead

The last time members of the public had a chance to see the Discovering the Rivers of Lewis & Clark traveling exhibit was 2006 in Oregon. While the public at large still has to wait a few more years to see it once again, exhibit pieces made the trip out of storage to their permanent home at the Mead Building, the future home of the Dakota Territorial Museum, Friday.

Dakota Territorial Museum director Crystal Nelson told the Press & Dakotan the exhibit has spent the interim in storage after being donated to the museum.

"The Discovering the Rivers of Lewis & Clark traveling exhibit had been in storage for a couple of years after the bicentennial of the Corps of Discovery (in 2004) was over," Nelson said. "The organization that owned it was the American Rivers, Inc. in Washington D.C. They wanted to donate the orbibit to an ortanization or comowhere exhibit to an organization or somewhere along the Missouri River where the exhibit could be seen. It was a choice between us and Sioux City and we ended up making the right kind of deal.'

After acquiring the exhibit in 2007, Nelson said the pieces would have to be crated and stored until the museum had the room. 'We got the exhibit — it's numerous

crates and a very large exhibit, actually,' she said. "We put it in storage thanks to First Dakota National Bank. ... As we are working on the exhibit planning for the Mead Building, this particular exhibit is going to be incorporated into the permanent gallery as per our agreement with American Rivers. In preparation for that, we really need to kind of get the exhibit out of storage and start working with the pieces, getting it set up, seeing how it's going to fit in to the building."

Friday morning, members of the South Dakota National Guard began hauling 20

VERMILLION — It's more than just a facelift that the Vermillion High School has been getting this summer. It's an upgrade according to Vermillion School District Superintendent Mark Froke.

"The outcome is to upgrade all the classrooms and the restroom areas to provide an attractive, comfortable atmosphere for the students and staff," he said. "The environment will be more comfortable from the standpoint of heating and ventilation, and also the system will be much more efficient from the standpoint of naving the latest equipment installed versus equipment that was installed 50 years ago. You look down in the boiler room now and you see a completely different picture than you did three months ago. We had a couple big boilers in there before. Now we have three smaller units. One of them will probably handle most of the heating needed throughout the season. We're bringing the classrooms into 21st century standards."

The Yankton High School National Honor Society has decided to partner with the Yankton Homeless Shelter in an attempt to raise money for the purpose of expanding its current facilities.

"We don't like to call people home-less," said Chair of the Homeless Shelter Board Pastor Jon Cooke. "We like to describe the people that visit our shelter as people who are experiencing homelessness; that could be anyone of us."

The shelter, located on Fourth Street, opened in 1994 for the original purpose of sheltering homeless men. However, since 2010, the increasingly

growing need caused their mission to expand to include families, women and children.

'The River City Domestic Violence Center provides shelter for women and children but some women and children don't qualify because they may be homeless for some reasons other than domestic violence," Cooke said. "As a result, we have opened our doors to cover this sort of missing element in society that wasn't there, but is more prevalent now."

In 2014 the shelter was housing 136 individuals, including 63 children. The current shelter only has 9 beds and an apartment area in the basement facility. Because living spaces are limited, the shelter overflows some people into motels, which can get very costly.

Last year, 63 individuals were sheltered in the StarLite Inn Motel, which
