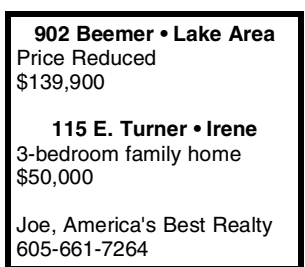

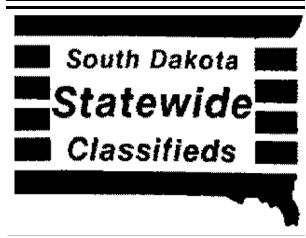

to use their cell phones or other electronic devices for the entire stay.

The purpose of the camp is simple, according to assistant coach Dan Mitchell: Present an opportunity for a state championship team to get to know each other better.

"Any time that you get to spend with your team, you're learning about them," Mitchell said. "They can be all over during the summer, but now it's time to come together."

"We've always talked about everyone being on the same page, and this is an excellent start."

At the camp, the players will be divided into four groups, with points available for certain tasks - cooking for their teammates, cleaning up after their teammates and serving their teammates, etc.

Yes, there will be the usual pre-season practices, but that's the main point, Mitchell said. The opportunity, for example, to sit by a fire and share stories could be hugely beneficial for the Bucks.

"It's definitely something new," senior Sheldon Gant said. "But it sounds like a lot of fun, especially for a younger team like ours."

To that point, the Bucks graduated 21 seniors from last fall's squad that won the Class 11AA championship, the program's first since 2002. While Yankton won't exactly be short on returning talent for this season, this week's leadership camp will no doubt help.

"We lost some really good seniors, so it'll be good for those younger guys to have something like this," Haak said. "They can step up now and be leaders."

Players, no matter their age or experience, will also have to contend this week with not having their phones for three nights - those will be collected by the coaches.

"I think we can last three days," senior Bradey Sorenson said. "It might be a challenge, but we can do it."

"I'm just not sure what to expect."

Although they joked ahead of time that they shouldn't have any problem not texting for three or four days, by the time Thursday or Friday rolls around, it could be a different story. "I know I'm just as guilty as everyone else, and it's probably not something you realize you're doing," Haak said. "It'll be good for us."

And that's the point, Mitchell said.

"We want them focused on each other, and on the game of football," said Mitchell, who is also the president of the South Dakota Football Coaches Association. "We don't want to have any outside disturbances."

"If you take those (phones) away, then you can get to know your neighbor; maybe somebody new."

The coaches will, however, have their phones with them, in case of emergencies or if a situation arises where a parent needs to reach their son.

"I don't have a smart phone, so it might not be as hard for me," Muth said, smiling. "But I think we can do it."

To help pay for the trip, Bucks players are currently engaged in two fundraisers: One through Walt's Homestyle Foods and one through an entertainment coupon application for a smart phone.

Those interested in purchasing - \$20 in each fundraiser - any of the two options can contact a player or a coach, Mitchell said.

The phone app, in particular, allows the buyer to pull up any participating business that features discounts, at gas stations, restaurants, etc. The company Yankton has been working with has also worked with businesses in the Brookings market to accommodate parents and fans that will be traveling for the Bucks' season opener in Brookings on Aug. 28, according to Mitchell.

Before the Bucks start thinking about defending their state title with a rematch with the Brookings Bobcats, they're first focused on this week's leadership camp.

"It'll be a great opportunity and a good bonding experience," Sorenson said.

Former School Bus Driver Accused Of Stalking Woman

PAPILLION, Neb. (AP) — Sarpy County prosecutors are accusing a former Gretna school bus driver of stalking a woman he met when she rode the bus as a girl.

The Omaha World-Herald reports that 32-year-old Kevin Klingensmith is charged with felony stalking.

Deputy Sarpy County Attorney Phil Kleine says officers were called to the woman's residence on April 20 after the family spotted someone running across the property.

Kleine says investigators used camera footage to identify the man as Klingensmith.

Klingensmith's attorney says his client denies he was on the property.

Court records show that judges have approved nine protection orders against Klingensmith that were sought by the accuser's family, starting when she was 11 years old.

Kleine says Klingensmith met her when he was a bus driver for Gretna Public Schools.

She said that her time on the commission has been a real learning experience.

"I've grown as an individual and been able to learn more about how municipalities work," she said. "I've been studying it for years."

Blaalid said one of her biggest accomplishments during her tenure is one she won't even have a chance to see put into practice.

"I'm disappointed I'm not actually going to be able to see it come to fruition, but since I've been on the commission, I'm a program evaluator and I love strategic planning, so it's always been a push for me on the commission to make sure that our city has an updated strategic plan," she said. "I felt like when I got on the commission, we had that 20-year plan and, of course, our Capital Improvements Plan, but no vision of where we wanted to go as a community. I'm really excited about the city doing strategic planning in January because I think it will give us a better idea of where we're going and what we need to do to achieve that."

City Manager Amy Nelson said Blaalid's impact on the commission has gone well beyond legislation.

"She's been a real great addition to our group," Nelson said. "She's got a high-energy personality and she's willing to speak her mind and really investigate and find out a lot of information on things. ... (Commissioners) are my supervisors, but you also

become friends with (them). She really taught me not to take myself too seriously and to remember to enjoy what we're doing here because we are doing good work for the community."

She believes that the experience she gained during her time with the City Commission will also help her out in the classroom.

"I think that my experience being in municipal government will help my students understand how municipalities work, how systems work because it's really hard to get the experience if you're not within that system," she said. "Some people tend to get really frustrated as to why it moves so slowly to make a law or to make an ordinance, but there's such a process that a lot of people don't understand, so I can share that with my students and other people in the community."

While Blaalid is moving on to teaching for the time being, she said she hasn't entirely closed the door on politics yet.

"I definitely think it's something I'll look towards for the future," she said. "At this point in my life, that chapter is kind of closed, but I would definitely look towards something in the future again."

She added that she's enjoyed working for the City of Yankton.

"Yankton's such a great community," she said. "I've been really fortunate to work with a lot of amazing citizens that care about our community."

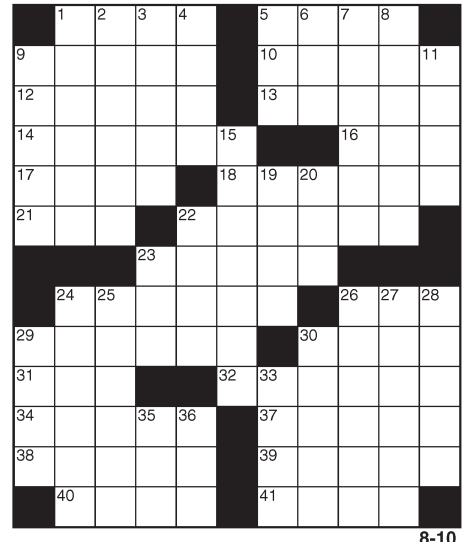
