

Centers

Course sections offered at the campuses changed with the enrollments, as Sioux Falls cut 18 percent and Pierre slashed 32 percent, while Rapid City added 43 percent.

Rapid City saw a yellow light in 2014 as headcount and full-time equivalents slipped 8 percent.

The concept of the centers was to offer courses from the traditional state universities in three major communities where the populations had limited access to the public university system.

But the on-campus headcounts at the traditional state universities increased 2 percent from fall 2008 to fall 2014, while the university centers combined fell 12 percent, a situation the briefing paper describes as "a clear area of concern."

Meanwhile distance courses – those that aren't taught face to face – offered through the state universities "grew by a staggering 98.5 percent" during the same period, according to the report.

The centers rely primarily on student tuition to pay the costs but various subsidies have increasingly come into use at Sioux Falls and Pierre in recent years.

The Pierre center's director works two jobs and draws her salary from the

through fall 2014: Headcounts dropped 27 percent at Sioux Falls and 43 percent at Pierre, while increasing a net 22 percent at Rapid City. Headcount measures total students regardless of the credits they take;

Full-time equivalents – combining all credit hours into hypothetical full-time students – likewise decreased 24 percent at Sioux Falls and 45 percent at Pierre, while rising 38 percent at Rapid City; and

regents' central office, for example, while the Sioux Falls center's deepening deficits were covered the past three years by a reserve fund.

The reserve now is empty, while officials at the Sioux Falls center forecast there will be a \$1 million shortfall for the coming year, with \$2 million of revenue and \$3 million in expenses.

Two possible additional uses for the centers outlined in the briefing paper are providing space for nursing education and for agricultural and cooperative extension purposes.
