Mingo Wins SDGA Amateur

BRANDON - Yankton native Megan Mingo held off Parkston senior-tobe Sydney Bormann for top honors in the 53rd annual South Dakota Golf Association women's championships, which concluded on Sunday at the Brandon Golf Course.

Mingo, who will be a junior competing at South Dakota State University this fall, shot rounds of 71, 70 and 75 in the three-day event for a 216, three strokes better than Bormann. McKayla Poppens of Sioux Falls finished third at 225. Hallie Getz, who teamed with fellow Jackrabbit Mingo for the SDGA Two-Woman championship a week ago, finished fourth at 227.

Also in the champi-onship flight, Parkston senior-to-by Sydney Weber and Parkston grad Jordan Bormann, who will be a junior at Augustana, each shot 230.

Professional golfer Doug Quinones was able to win the 2015 Hillcrest 42nd Pro-Am on Sunday at Hillcrest Golf & Country Club in Yankton by defeating Andre Metzger in a onehole playoff.

With only one stroke between them on the final hole, Metzger and Quinones hit two very different tee shots, Metzger going short and left of the green and Quinones going just short and right of the green. Metzger hit his second shot first and failed to get on the green after he chipped the ball on and it rolled off an unforgiving slope on the side of the green. With a huge opportunity Quinones hit a beautiful chip shot that almost went in and one that he had thought went in. Ouinones turned around to celebrate but then when he saw the ball wasn't in he grabbed his face in dismay.

"I thought it was in and actually turned away when it was a couple of feet from the hole, then I looked back and saw it not in," Quinones said. "I knew at least if he doesn't make it we are going into a playoff, so I was happy with where it ended up." After another chip and putt

from Metzger and a tap-in putt from Ouinones the two were tied with no holes to go in the tournament and went back to the 18th tee box to play a playoff hole to break the tie. The results of the playoff hole were the same with Metzger chipping over the green once again to par the hole and Quinones winning making another birdie

"After Andre chipped it over, I knew I just had to get it close to put pressure on him to make the shot," Quinones said. "Chipped it up there to a couple of feet and he didn't make it and that was it."

Quinones shot a three-under 69 on the tournament's final day, and took home \$21,000 in earnings. "I can't even describe how it

feels," Quinones said. "It feels great.

It was an up and down day for Quinones (16-under), of Sioux Falls, and Metzger (17-under), of Sioux Falls, who were each part of the final group, the leaders, to tee off on Sunday along with Zenon Brown (12-under), of Arvada, Colorado. The group stayed true to its form as the top three at the beginning of the day stayed the top three at the end of the day with Quinones finishing first, Metzger second, and Brown third.

On the front nine of the round it looked to be Metzger's tournament after making four birdies on the first eight holes and going to the back nine with a three stroke lead over Ouinones and five strokes over Brown





When the Yankton Tappers started their elimination game with Sturgis in the South Dakota State Class A Ama-teur Baseball Tournament on Saturday, Yankton manager Ross Heine was hoping starting pitcher Kaleb Bromley would give the team five or six good innings.

He did that and more, taking a no-hitter into the ninth inning of a 4-1 Tappers victory at Bob Tereshinski Stadium at Riverside Field.

Yankton advances to play Aug. 14 in Mitchell against Aberdeen, 11-1 losers to the Sioux Falls Brewers on Sunday.

'Realistically, if he got five or six innings with only one or two runs given up, it would have been a good outing," Heine said of Bromley, a redshirt for Mount Marty College last season. "What he came out and did was amazing." Neither team hit the ball

early, as Sturgis pitcher Ryne Lees, a pitcher at Augustana College, also went the first four innings without allowing a hit. But Bromley walked three batters in the third to load the bases before getting Lees to fly out to left to end the threat.

After stumbling in the third, Bromley walked just three batters in the next five innings while striking out five. One batter reached after a wild pitch on a third strike.

"I focused on my mechan-ics," Bromley said. "I was falling off early, so I stuck with going straight to the plate and found the zone again.

As Bromley found his groove and the no-hitter continued, Yankton catcher Kory Bromley – Kaleb's older brother - tried to "do the same things I always do.' "I didn't change anything,"

he said. "I was messing with him, like I always do. I didn't stray from what we normally do. I wasn't calling things any differently.

"It seemed to work out pretty well."

The Tappers broke through in the fifth. After a leadoff single by Nik Davis, an error and a walk loaded the bases, Kenny Tomek singled to plate the game's first run. Dave

Schmidt followed with an RBI groundout to give Yankton a 2-0 advantage. "Kenny came through

today," Heine said of Tomek, the Tappers' ninth hitter in the order.

Kaleb Bromley struggled again in the eighth, walking pinch-hitter Daryl Deneke and leadoff hitter Parks Brigman to start the frame. But he settled back in, striking out the next batter and getting the next two for infield outs to end the threat.

Yankton added insurance runs in the ninth. Pinch-hitter Devin Gullikson was hit by a pitch, and Tomek followed with a two-out double. Schmidt's infield single scored both Gullikson and the speedy Tomek.

John Sayles led off the ninth by looping a shot over Tomek's head in right field, ending the no-hit bid. After a balk, Brandon Tycz lined a shot to left that just missed the glove of Davis to score a run. Nick Owen followed with a single, sending the Tappers to the bullpen for Jesse Bailey, who struck out two and got an
