Marlin LaCroix of LaCroix Construction. Neal said they were already seeing interest in Riverboat Days camping with one RV enthusiast showing up as early as Sunday. "There's a handful of people that have reserved spots for Riverboat Days," he said. Neal added they'll be very busy beyond Riverboat Days as well. "This winter we plan on clearing this whole beach area and getting that dressed up really nice," he said. "We plan to have a nice beach, maybe volleyball down there. We're going to build a nice deck (by the riverside). There are big plans there; we've just had to concentrate on trying to get some of the campsites done first."

He said there are also plans to add in a boat dock near the beach. Other steps include finishing up utility work, laying down sod between pads, laying down crushed asphalt on the roads to hold down dust and general tidying up. Neal said much of the park's future additions will also depend on what patrons may suggest to them. "Once people come in, we're going to kind of take their advice on what they would like to see," he said. "We want to be open with building the stuff they want to see coming in here, too." Though much work still remains on the first phase of the project, LaCroix was also looking at the park's future projects, which will largely revolve around a pond on the south side of the resort dug out during construction of the Discovery Bridge. "Next season, we would like to get started on the big

recreation center that will be a walk-out from the pond," he said. "We want to have that big enough so that people could have events and weddings there." Future plans also call for cabins encircling the pond. Marlin said there's excitement in the community about the resort's opening. "We've heard a lot of good buzz about it," Marlin said. "It just seems like everybody can't wait to get started on it." Neal said he's happy with the progress so far. "I've been really pleased with the way things have been going," he said. and Megan Grode-Wolters talked at the Recovery Meeting, stressing the different stages that are normal for those who have experienced a devastating loss. The process of recovery patterned after the Kubler-Ross Grief Cycle, includes denial, bargaining, depression, anger, and acceptance. Heads nodded in agreement here and there in the room as each step was discussed. What the community is doing to recover also was discussed, with Kavanaugh noting that "rituals serve an important purpose of grounding us and providing history and hope for the future." The loss of landmarks, such as the historic Zion

Lutheran Church, and other rituals "can make us feel vulnerable," he said. The community, however, has held traditional events since the tornado, starting with the Memorial Day observance at the Legion Hall, the Fourth of July Kids' Day and fireworks at the ball diamond, the recently completed All School Reunion, and the upcoming Kuchen Festival and Harvest Festival. Building the New Normal for the town will be an ongoing process, it was noted. Residents noted how impressive it was that, as Earla Strid put it, "people from everywhere came and helped us." She and her husband, Dick, recently completed almost three months of helping neighbors through the Distribution Center. Barbara Hoffman, whose house sustained \$40,000 worth of damage and is just now being completed, com-

mented on "the people from Wessington Springs who came to help us." That city recently observed its one-year anniversary of tornado devastation. Kavanaugh reminded residents that they, too, should be thinking of how to commemorate the May 10 anniversary of Delmont's devastation. There should be a celebration, he said, to point out "We survived — it made us stronger." Mayor Mae Gunnare agreed the next day that she had been told the Recovery Meetings should continue: "People want more of it." Gunnare said that after the dinner and introductions, she spent time with the children across the street at the old Fire Hall, where the Red Cross was conducting play therapy for the youngsters. "Children are more resilient than adults," Gunnare

said, as long as some sense of normalcy can be established. The routine of school starting, noted Wolters, should help. Adults, however, have more to deal with, providing food and shelter and income. Gunnare said the city will be struggling financially with the loss of residents, their tax dollars and the water and sewer fees they paid. The city has had one of four loans forgiven, she said, and is working with state and federal officials to try to either forgive the remaining loans or delay their repayment. However, Gunnare said, she is trying to take the whole process "one day at a time."
