Manager: Michael Jordan Protects Image For Youngsters

CHICAGO (AP) — Michael Jordan's business manager says the former basketball star's image has been meticulously protected so young people will know of his achievements. Curtis Polk testified Monday in federal court in Chicago in the former Chicago Bulls star's lawsuit seeking damages from a now-defunct grocery store chain that used his image without permission. Polk says marketing deals can have promotional value for Jordan beyond cash compensation. But defense attorney Steve Rosenfeld disputed the value of Jordan's recent deals, focusing on a \$500,000 agreement that allowed Sirius Radio to use Jordan's image in an ad.

he said, "that's how it happens."  
Langsdorf the passing game has improved with the return of seasoned receivers Jordan Westerkamp and De'Mornay Pierson-El from

minor injuries. "It's players, not plays," Langsdorf said. "When you get some of those guys who are your top guys playing, it makes it look better for sure."  
This week's practices will be important for getting the offense to run smoother because next week marks the start of preparations for the

Sept. 5 opener against BYU. "We're close," Armstrong said. "Communication, that's the one thing we have to focus on these next couple weeks. We have everything down pat where we need to be. Quarterback-wise, we have to be sharper when it comes to making reads. Overall, we're in good shape. I think we can get better."

Bakhtiari Sidelined In Packers Camp

GREEN BAY, Wis. (AP) — A sore knee sidelined left tackle David Bakhtiari at Packers training camp Monday and it was unclear if the starting offensive lineman will play in this weekend's preseason game at Pittsburgh.  
Coach Mike McCarthy did not offer details on the injury to the third-year tackle. Asked if he was concerned about Bakhtiari, McCarthy replied, "Not today."  
"He's going to be on a treatment program for at least the next couple days," he said. "That's straight out of the doctor's mouth."  
Veteran Bryan Bulaga said that with ample practice time, he could make the switch from right to left tackle if needed.  
"I don't know what Dave's situation for this week is," Bulaga said. "All I've been told is that I'm playing right tackle this week."

The Packers' backup plan is pertinent because Bakhtiari protects the blind side of NFL MVP Aaron Rodgers. Bakhtiari struggled in the preseason opener at New England on Thursday night, when he allowed two sacks. He has made 35 consecutive starts since taking over for Bulaga as a rookie fourth-round pick in 2013.  
With Bakhtiari not practicing, fourth-year backup Don Barclay worked at left tackle with the No. 1 offense. Barclay is coming off a torn ACL in his right knee suffered early in camp last year and has been working his way back into form.  
McCarthy said the Packers would likely move Bulaga to left tackle if Bakhtiari's injury were to worsen. Barclay could then play right tackle in Bulaga's place.  
"You want to continue to create opportunities for players to increase their value,"

McCarthy said. "You do that by giving guys opportunities. That's no different for Donnie Barclay. I know Bryan Bulaga can play left tackle. That's something that we practice all the time. This is an opportunity for players to increase their value."  
Bulaga, who played left tackle in high school and in college at the University of Iowa, worked extensively at the position during the 2013 offseason but said he doesn't work there much these days. If Bakhtiari were to go down during the season, Bulaga said an in-game adjustment would be difficult but he'd be OK with a week of practice.  
"I think anyone would need some time at it. I'd say no matter which way you're switching, if you're going left-to-right at guard or tackle, I think you need a little time adjusting," Bulaga said. "Again, I just play where they tell me to play."

I wanted to stay closer to home," McKeever said. "Of course I thought about going further away, but I wanted my family to be able to come watch me at some point."  
While a five-hour trip is certainly not a small journey, hopping in car and riding for five hours to play basketball is nothing new for McKeever. Especially after this summer.  
She played for the Minnesota Fury, an AAU team out of the Twin Cities, which meant that every week she drove four hours each way for practice. And then further for tournaments – the longest being North Carolina. In McKeever, USD will be

getting one of Minnesota's top girls' basketball scorers. She averaged 24.8 points per game last season as a junior, and with 2,503 career points, could be another solid season away from potentially climbing to No. 2 all-time in the state.  
"I look at all the points I've scored, and I'm positive more than half of those are just layups or close to the basket," she said. "I love driving to the hoop; taking it myself."  
Not that she's a bad outside shooter or wouldn't take a pull-up jumper, she said, but her game is getting to the hoop. And she's been pretty successful doing that. During the 2014 Minnesota State Tournament, she tied a single-game state record for made free throws (20)

and broke the record for attempts (25).  
And then there's the defense. McKeever said she enjoys pressuring the opponents' best ball-handler and joked that USD coach Amy Williams – who herself loves to talk defense – calls her a "pirate."  
For McKeever, basketball wasn't the only reason she chose USD, she said. Sure, the upcoming arena – which will open during her freshman season (2016-17) – was nice, but she was also impressed with USD's Education Department; she wants to pursue a major in Elementary Education.  
"It's going to be good for me down there," she said.
