give a state of the county and what's going on. The biggest thing is information."

He added that, with an approaching referendum set for Sept. 29, many of the meetings will have a major focus on the county's roads.

"The biggest thing we're going to bring up is the road and bridge levy," he said. "It's been referred to a vote. That vote's going to happen at the end of September. I think this is a great opportunity to educate the citizens and for them to ask questions and get some feedback on their questions about it. That would be the number one topic, I would assume, at the town hall meetings."

In addition to the town hall meetings, the commission has tentatively scheduled a public forum on the issue Tuesday Sept. 1, at 7 p.m. at the Technical Education Center in Yankton.

On the levy, Woods said he's still hearing support for its passage.

"I've had a lot of positive feedback on it," he said. "I've had business owners and many people saying, 'We know the roads are in bad shape. I understand it. It's something that needs to be done.' I have not had any personal contact with someone who's been against it, so

I want to continue to educate the people out there."

A letter from a Yankton County citizen alleging misconduct on the part of the levy implementation was on the agenda Tuesday, but Woods said they were unable to address it.

He said the ultimate goal of the meetings is to get a measure of what the people of the county want.

"We here are representing the people and we want to know what their thoughts are," he said. "I don't like to assume what somebody is thinking because it's just not the right thing to do. We need to hear from the people what they want so we can make the right decision."
