Zebra Mussels Discovered In L&C Lake; Boats To Be Inspected

The South Dakota Game, Fish and Parks officials confirmed Thursday that more zebra mussels have been discovered in Lewis and Clark Lake

The mussels were of multiple sizes, indicating that zebra mussels are reproducing in Lewis and

Back in November, a single adult mussel was found by the South Dakota Game, Fish and Parks (GFP) staff on a dock removed from the lake. That discovery, along with the discovery of larval quagga mussels at Angostura Reservoir in western South Dakota, prompted GFP officials to put new rules in place prompting boaters to remove all drain plugs from watercraft prior to leaving boat ramp areas. While officials believe that most boaters are complying with the law, the now confirmed presence of these invasive mussels makes compliance even more critical. Boaters will see an increase of GFP staff at

all Lewis and Clark Lake boat ramps," said GFP assistant director of the Division of Wildlife, Arden Petersen. "We want to make sure people are aware of the regulations and the importance of draining all water from their livewells, baitwells and hulls

CROFTON, Neb. - The former city clerk has admitted she misappropriated municipal funds while working for city government.

Nancy Foxhoven, the former city clerk, issued a statement through Norfolk attorney Ron Temple. Her statement on the misappropriations appeared in the Crofton Journal weekly newspaper.

Foxhoven had served as city clerk for 26 years. However, irregularities surfaced earlier this year in the reporting of city financial operations. City Attorney Dan Hendrix and Interim City Manager Charlie Gail Hendrix met with Foxhoven about the irregularities, and she retired from office after the conversation.

El Nino To Remain **Strong Into Next Spring**

Thanks to the El Nino weather system, look for cooler, wetter conditions than normal this winter.

That's the word from both South Dakota and Illinois meteorologists.

El Nino will continue to play a significant role in North America's climate for the next several months, according to the latest temperature and precipitation outlooks, released Thursday by National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA).

"The current El Nino is forecast to increase in intensity through the winter season," said Laura Edwards, SDSU Extension Climate Field Specialist, in a news release.

'As a result, this fall we will continue to see the impacts of the warm tropical Pacific Ocean on our climate in the U.S.," she said.

With a strong El Nino, expect warmer conditions in the coming months, Edwards said.

Center's outlook for September and the season ahead indicate a typical El Nino pattern, with warmer than average conditions expected in the west and southeast," she said.

PIERRE – The battle over setting people's gender in South Dakota probably will carry into the 2016 legislative session.

The Legislature's interim committee dealing with the issue Thursday requested a draft of a potential state law.

The proposal from Rep. Roger Hunt, R-Brandon, would rely on official birth certificates and

visual inspections for determining gender rather than people deciding their own.

He said gender is determined at conception and the transgender debate is riding the gay marriage wave.

This is South Dakota. We haven't adopted the East Coast culture. We haven't adopted the West Coast culture. We maintain our own culture," Hunt said.

The committee vote was 6-5. The panel spent several hours

considering again the policy set last year by the South Dakota High School Activities Association board of directors.

The policy allows transgender students to participate in athlet-ics as members of the opposite sex.

The association's board is reworking pieces of the policy after legislators repeatedly at-
