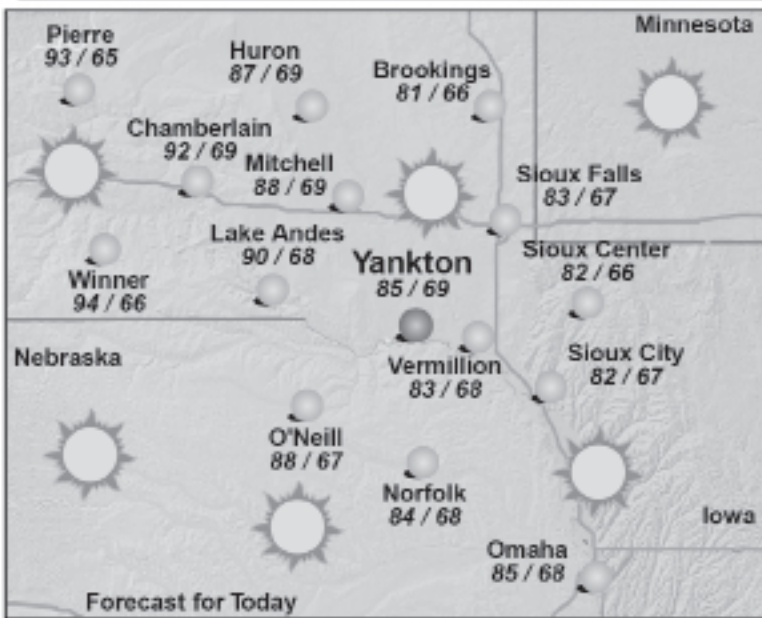

Missouri River Committee Meeting Set

OMAHA, Neb. — The Missouri River Recovery Implementation Committee (MRRIC) will be meeting Aug. 25-27, in Omaha, Nebraska. Public attendance is encouraged, and an opportunity is provided during each daily session for the public to address the Committee and the lead agencies...

The meeting will be held at the Embassy Suites Downtown/Old Market, 555 South Tenth Street, Omaha, Neb., beginning at 8 a.m. Tuesday, Aug. 25, and concluding at 12:30 p.m. Thursday, Aug. 27. The MRRIC meeting agenda can be found online at www.MRRIC.org. All meeting sessions are open to the public.

Updates regarding recent progress on the Missouri River Recovery Management Plan will be provided to the committee. The committee will seek final consensus on the MRRP Work plan recommendation as well as discuss consequences and tradeoffs for the bird alternatives. Members will learn about and discuss how the lead agencies are working through NEPA requirements. The committee will continue to engage with the Independent Science Advisory Panel and the Independent Social and Economic Technical Review Panel on the scientific, adaptive management and socio-economic components of the developing Management Plan.

MRRIC is a 70-member committee that comprises stakeholders and representatives of Tribal, state and federal governments throughout the Missouri River Basin. This committee provides recommendations to federal agencies on the current and future activities of the MRRP. The committee makes its substantive recommendations by consensus.

The committee, established in fall 2008, meets quarterly at various locations throughout the Missouri River Basin. It will begin the upcoming meeting having approved over 20 substantive recommendations addressed to the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service, who is responsible for endangered species protection and recovery, and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, who operates the bank stabilization and navigation project and the mainstem dams on the Missouri River.

Mussels

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arrived in the U.S. in the mid-1980s. Although usually less than an inch in size as adults, they can rapidly spread under the right conditions. These mussels can clog irrigation lines and damage boat motors and docks and their sharp shells can wash up on shorelines in large numbers making recreation difficult.

"Lewis and Clark Lake is at the bottom of our Missouri River reservoir system and this could potentially affect all waters below the Gavins Point Dam," said GFP chief of aquatic, John Lott. "The most likely way for these mussels to be transferred up river is on boats or in water contained by boats." The larval stage of zebra mussels, called veligers, are

nearly impossible to detect due to their small size, heightening the importance of the state's new boat draining laws. Veligers can be easily transported to new waters in even a small amount of water remaining anywhere in a boat or watercraft after a fishing or boating trip. "Right now South Dakota waters are at peak water temperatures for veligers to spread," said Lott. "Boaters on Lewis and Clark Lake need to be extra diligent and completely drain their boats before leaving boat ramp areas."

Completely draining a boat is the first step in making sure invasive species are not transferred to other waters. Boaters should clean their boats with 140 degree water and let them completely dry before launching their boats in other water bodies. SDSU/USD Online MPH Ranked Among Nation's Best

BROOKINGS — The online master of public health program offered by South Dakota State University and the University of South Dakota has been ranked 13th in the 50 Most Affordable Online MPH Programs 2015 by Top Master's in Healthcare Administration.

"The idea behind this program is to take the collective strengths in the health sciences that both campuses have and build a program around them," said Dennis Hedge, dean of SDSU's College of Pharmacy. "A great thing about this program is that beyond a degree opportunity, it directly addresses public health issues right here in the state of South Dakota."

The MPH program started classes in January 2015. Students can pursue the degree on a full-time or part-time basis, which has interested undergraduates and employed health-care professionals looking for the next level of education. To receive the degree, students must take 42 credit hours — 36 coming from core courses. "We use an interprofessional approach to the MPH program so that students learn from a wide range of public health scholars and practitioners at both campuses," said Mike Lawler, dean of USD's School of Health Sciences.

In addition to South Dakota State's College of Pharmacy, other colleges across the campus including the colleges of nursing, education and human sciences, and agriculture and biological sciences will also contribute faculty to teach classes and/or review projects. USD and its School of Health Sciences contributes expertise from programs such as addiction studies, physician assistant, occupational therapy, nursing and others. Both USD and SDSU can grant the MPH degree.

Top Master's in Healthcare Administration started the selection process by using College Navigator and Google to search, check and confirm a list of all the public health master's degrees in the United States that are offered via distance education. To clarify, this means that we only considered full graduate programs (not certificates) that are available 90 percent or more online (a few campus visits for seminars or workshops were acceptable, but "hybrid" programs and ones with regular face-to-face sessions in the curriculum were not).

It also used College Navigator to collect each school's tuition rates for graduate programs, as well as to determine the associated fees for attendance. For the purposes of creating a ranking, the firm averaged each public school's in-state and out-of-state rates to determine a single approximate cost.

Unofficial but well-informed sources indicated today that the British government is seeking a military alliance with the United States. Canadian-American discussions on mutual defense are considered in these quarters.

50 YEARS AGO: Saturday, August 21, 1965. William Braxton Boyd, wanted by the FBI for probation violation in Oklahoma, was taken into custody by Bon Homme county authorities Friday after a roadblock was set up by several county and state officials at Tabor. Several local swimmers were first place winners at the South Dakota State Swimming Championships in Brookings. In the 8 and under division, Kristi Cody placed first in the 200 IM, 100 freestyle, 50 backstroke, 100 backstroke, 50 butterfly and 100 butterfly events.

25 YEARS AGO: Tuesday, August 21, 1990. Downtown Yankton business officials voted against any projects for Business Improvement District 1991. In a straw ballot conducted by the BID board of the district's 202 members, only 124 responded. The vote, tabulated at Monday's meeting, was 85 against and 49 in favor of renewing a program for the downtown area.

The U.S. stock market endured its worst performance in 18 months on Thursday, driven lower by another slump in Chinese shares and heavy selling by technical traders.
