IRS Phone Scam Targeting Citizens Of South Dakota

PIERRE — Attorney General Marty Jackley is warning South Dakotans of an Internal Revenue Service (IRS) phone scam that has surfaced in South Dakota.

The scam involves a caller telling the consumer they are being sued by the IRS for an unresolved debt. Some of the threats reported went as far to say there has been an arrest warrant issued for the consumer. The caller will then ask for personal identifying information or demand payment by wiring money.

"These scam artists use the threat of arrest to convince trusting individuals to pay a debt that is not legitimate. The IRS does not ask for personal identifying or financial information through phone calls," said Jackley.

The Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division believes some of these calls may be a result of the IRS data breach in May 2015. Consumers who have received these phone calls should contact the Attorney

General's Consumer Protection Division at 1-800-300-1986 or consumerhelp@ state.sd.us. If you have a phone message claiming to be the IRS, do not use the number left on your phone, immediately contact the IRS at 1-800-829-1040 to confirm whether the IRS is trying to contact you about a tax return.

Consumers are encouraged to check their credit report with the three nationwide credit reporting agencies: Equifax, Experian

and TransUnion. Visit www. AnnualCreditReport.com or call 1-877-322-8228 for a free copy of these credit reports. Consumers are entitled to a free copy from each company every 12 months. If consumers find errors on their report, contact the reporting agency in writing. Consumers can also place a fraud alert on their credit reports to help mitigate potential issues by contacting the three credit reporting

PIERRE — The South Dakota Department of Agriculture has financial programs available for agricultural producers and agricultural related businesses.

The Department of Agriculture's financial programs partner with lenders across the state to provide borrowers with lower interest rates. Programs are available for beginning farmers, livestock purchases, facility expansion, grain storage, manure management projects and value added businesses.

USD Sanford Program Aids Native American Students

VERMILLION — The University of South Dakota Sanford School of Medicine has been awarded \$446,671 from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services to help Native American students on the Pine Ridge and Yankton reservations.

The grant, from the HHS' National Workforce Diversity Pipeline Program, funds the first year of the medical school's multi-year Native American Healthcare Scholars Program. That effort provides career and academic mentoring as well as career awareness-building activities for selected upper-level high school students from the Red Cloud High School on the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation and Wagner Community School on the Yankton Indian Reservation.

The Native American Healthcare Scholars Program is a part of the school's strategic diversity plan and contributes to its efforts to further diversify health care professions, said Gerald J. Yutrzenka, associate dean for diversity and inclusion.

'We are working to assist Native American high school students who have demonstrated an interest in becoming a physician or in pursuing careers in one of the other health care professions. If the program's Native American high school students decide to attend USD, which we hope they will all do, we will then have the opportunity to continue to foster their development as they move along their career path," he said.

The USD program to help identify, mentor and encourage young Native Americans to pursue careers in health care begins this year and will continue into 2020.


