Tereshinski Turf Project Receives Grant

The Bob Tereshinski Field Turf Project recently learned that it was the recipient of a 2015 Twins Fields for Kids Grant through the Minnesota Twins Community Fund.

The grant, totaling \$5,000 will go towards the field turf project that is named for long-time Lancers baseball coach and Yankton baseball supporter, Bob Tereshinski.

The Twins Community Fund's Twins Fields for Kids program provides financial support to improve baseball and/or softball facilities for youth in the Upper Midwest and Southwest Florida. The program makes matching grants to nonprofit organizations and local government units that operate baseball and/or softball programs. The Twins Community Fund and its grant programs are supported in part by Target, US Bank, Treasure Island and Delta. Since its inception in 1999, the program has granted more than \$3.2 million to improve nearly 650 Upper Midwest and Southwest Florida ball fields.

In October 2013, Mount Marty College and the Yankton Baseball Association began work to seek approval and funding for the Riverside Baseball Stadium Turf Project. The MMC Lancers baseball team plays their entire home schedule at the newly renovated stadium in addition to all the games played by the Yankton Baseball Association — those games together total more than 200 games. The need for permanent turf is a major piece of the puzzle.

Highway 46 Construction Takes Place

The South Dakota Department of Transportation says crews will be placing new asphalt surfacing on Highway 46 from the intersection of highways 46 and 25 to the Menno Road north of Yankton.

Construction crews began milling operations Aug. 20 to remove the existing road surface. Asphalt paving operations are expected to start the week of Aug. 31.

Traffic in the work zone has been reduced to one lane and guided through the project with the use of flaggers and a pilot car.

Motorists can expect a delay of up to 10 minutes during daytime hours and should be alert for suddenly slowing and stopped traffic in advance of the work zone.

Spencer Quarries, Inc. is the prime contractor on the \$1.8 million project.
