State Artist Application Deadline Is Sept. 1

PIERRE — Artists are reminded that the deadline to apply to the South Dakota Arts Council's Artists in Schools and Communities (AISC) and Touring Arts programs is Sept. 1.

The Artists in Schools and Communities program provides intensive, hands-on training in all arts disciplines to students of all ages across the state by providing funds to schools and nonprofit organizations that bring in groups

and individuals for week-long artist residencies. The artists are responsible for developing their residency lesson plans. Residencies are coordinated through the South Dakota Arts Council office as part of the Arts in Education program.

The SDAC's Touring Arts roster provides quality arts experiences in all regions of the state through a matching grant program for performances, programs and exhibits. Nonprofit organizations work

directly with the artists available for booking during the two-year touring period.

Artists interested in applying for the Artists in Schools and Communities or Touring Arts programs must apply online through the SDAC's e-grants system. Hard copies of the applications will not be accepted.

a Pierre business, Personal Group. Drapeaux had worked for the business immediately prior to joining Moore at the federal agency.

The contract was initially blocked because of a federal requirement for a one-year break of service between a federal employee and a potential contractor.

The U.S. Department of Interior's inspector general found the contract specialist assigned to the matter was removed from the proceedings and the matter was reassigned to a different contract specialist in 2011.

The inspector general's investigation also found Moore took the situation to others above him in the federal department.

The contract eventually went to a business subsidiary for the Winnebago Tribe

in Nebraska. That company, All-Native Inc., then subcontracted with Personal Group and Melmer.

The Personal Group holds a state contract for data-entry services performed at the state women's prison at Pierre. The state contract for \$350,000 annually began in October 2010 and begins its fifth and final year on Sept. 30, 2015.

The company, incorporated under the name Personal Group, uses the name Per-Group and promotes itself as Native American owned and operated.

Drapeaux became acting director at the federal bureau after Moore's departure. He subsequently was appointed deputy superintendent for business services at Grand Canyon National Park.

The inspector general's 15-page report concluded Moore and Drapeaux appeared to have acted in violation of Federal ethics regulations

governing impartiality and the use of public office for private gain... Finally, other BIE officials who knew of these conflicts of interest chose to ignore them during the procurement process.

The report further noted: "The U.S. Attorney's Office for the Eastern District of Virginia has declined to prosecute this case."

In June 2013 Moore was named state Indian education director again on a temporary basis.

The director of Indian education post in the state department has been difficult to keep filled. Mato

Standing High of Rapid City became the latest appointee in June. The department didn't issue a news release.
