Soccer: Coyotes Fall To Iowa State 3-0

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VERMILLION - Parker Rytz wanted a change of scenery.

Safe to say, she's found exactly that. From her home town of Encinitas, California — a coastal town north of San Diego — Rytz found her way to the University of South Dakota, a far cry from the hustle and bustle of a major metropolis. But that's just what Rytz, a freshman goalkeeper for the Coyotes, was looking for.

"I wanted to go to the Midwest and experience something new," she said after Sunday afternoon's 3-0 loss to Iowa State in Vermillion.

The daughter of two parents who had attended Grand Valley State University in Michigan, Rytz very nearly went that same route. Ultimately, though, she chose USD, and as the Coyotes (0-2) have already seen through two games, she's making an immediate impact.

Rytz, who at 5-foot-11 is a tall stopper in front of the net, played all 90 minutes in Friday's 1-0 loss at Creighton, and Sunday allowed one goal – with five saves - in 71 minutes of action.

"You never know with a freshman coming in, how they'll be," head coach

Mandy Green said. "There were some distribution things she cleaned up (Sunday) that gave me a heart attack against Creighton.

But she just makes saves." Such a high-stress position — where you're literally the last line of defense for your team - can understandably be a lot for a freshman to take in, but Rytz in-

sists that she enjoys the responsibility. "It's been really exciting," she said. "Nerve-wracking of course, but I've loved every minute I've been out on the

field." And like many of her freshman team-

mates, Rytz figures to see a lot of action in her first season. The Coyotes also have sophomore

Sydney Hardin at goalkeeper, as well as freshman Coral Suarez (another California native), but it's been Rytz who has emerged early – one exhibition games and two regular season games.

"She's learning different things,"

Green said. "The team has a lot of con-fidence in her. She's earning more and more playing time every day."

It's the same situation for a number of other Coyote freshmen.

Seven of the team's 12 freshmen saw the field on Sunday, and although the result was the same as Friday's opener, the Coyotes — picked to finish seventh in the Summit League — are seeing small signs of progress, their coach said.

"Even this, (Sunday), there were moments we saw that were better than when we played Creighton," Green said. We're getting better with things.

"I don't like that we gave up three soft goals, but we're getting better as a team.

Many of those areas of progression are things such as speed of play (lowa State was a step faster most of the day) and off-the-ball movements, Green said. Thirteen corner kicks by the Cy-

clones (2-0), of course, was an area of concern, according to Green.

But a game like Sunday was exactly why USD scheduled tougher in the nonconference. Facing teams like Nebraska

Savey Learned From Best 4-O's: Twins

A Season After Watching From Sidelines, Senior Looks To Add His Name To List Of Yankton's Top Receivers

Blake Savey is well aware of the shoes he'll be asked to fill.

Offensive weapon. Savey, who missed all but one game last season because of a knee injury, has had a front-row seat for two of the best wide receivers in Yankton High School football history: J.J. Hejna and Brady Hale.

Two of our best receivers," Savey said after a practice last week, before adding. "Ever.'

Hejna holds school records in receptions (92) and receiving yards (1659), while Hale recorded 52 catches for 561 yards in his career.

And on top of that, Savey also watched Evan Greeneway and Matt Fitzgerald put up gaudy numbers as seniors during last year's run to a Class 11AA state championship - both, along with Hale, now play Division I football at South Dakota

"I was just getting into the swing of things last year when I got hurt, so that was tough watching from the sidelines," he said.

"It's just exciting to be back out here and be a big contributor."

And not just a contributor on the stat sheet.

The Jackrabbits return to action Friday when they travel to play lowa at lowa City, lowa. They then travel to Des Moines to play Drake Sunday.




