Vermillion SB Member Named

VERMILLION — The Vermillion School Board held a special meeting on Tuesday night to appoint a new board member to finish out the final year of current board president Chris Esping's term. Esping announced earlier this month that due to her family's upcoming move to Sioux Falls she would not be able to finish out the year.

Esping said four people had indicated they were interested in the position.

Following a short executive session where the current board members discussed the candidates, it was unanimously approved to appoint Jim Peterson as the new board member.

"We had four highly qualified candidates," Esping said. "They all brought great skills and their own personal attributes and convictions and strengths to the board. It was not an easy decision on our part. Jim will bring a business aspect to the board, which we thought was important. He certainly has a very vested interest in doing what is best for kids, based on all of his activities and the time he has spent as booster club chair. So, we will take advantage of his leadership and community interaction."

Esping said her final meeting serving the Vermillion School District was bitter sweet.

"I am sad, but I am also just very proud of everything

I have accomplished on the board," she said. "I am ready. I had figured this would be my last term anyways."

She noted this was her fourth term and had just completed her 11th year on the board, the last three serving as president.

"It was time for someone else," she said. "When I first joined the board I had three very young kids in this district. I was a graduate of Vermillion High School, a life-long resident. My boss encouraged me to run. She said we needed a female on the board and that we needed somebody young. I just wanted to get involved and be directly involved in my kid's education and influence that, as well as, get more involved in the community and learn leadership skills."

She said she felt she has accomplished those goals.

"This is not easy for me," Esping admitted. "Jim will finish out the year for me, elections are typically held in April but sometimes it can be a little bit later. Some years we go with the city election. So I am only giving up 11 months, but a lot can happen in those 11 months."

Esping said she believes she is leaving the board in good hands.

"Just keep focusing on the kids and what is best for all of the kids in the district," she said. "It is important to keep moving forward. We are one of the best schools in the state and I think it is important to maintain that. Just do what is best for the school."

Legislative Planning Committee Meeting

PIERRE — The Legislative Planning Committee, chaired by Representative Scott Munsterman (R-Brookings), will meet Monday, Aug. 31, in Room 412 of the State Capitol, at 10:00 a.m. (CDT).

The committee will hear from Dr. Michael Rush, Executive Director of the South Dakota Board of Regents, and others from the Board of Regents' staff who will provide an overview of public higher education in South Dakota and also discuss future plans and goals for the institutions under the control of the Board of Regents.

In the afternoon, the committee will review benchmarks and performance measures for all public postsecondary education, including the institutions of higher education and the postsecondary technical institutes.

Lastly, committee members will discuss whether to develop benchmarks and performance measures for other areas of state government that the committee has not yet examined.

The meeting is open to the public, and public testimony will be taken that afternoon.

The Legislative Planning Committee was established during the 2012 Legislative session. In addition to Rep. Munsterman, committee members are Sen. Mike Vehle (R-Mitchell), Vice Chair; Sen. Corey Brown, (R-Gettysburg) President Pro Tem; Rep. Dean Wink, (R-Howes) Speaker of the House and Executive Board Chair; Sens. Terri Haverly (R-Rapid City); Ried Holien (R-Watertown); Scott Parsley (D-Madison); and Reps. Shawn Bordeaux (D-Mission); Kristin Conzet (R-Rapid City); and Jacqueline Sly (R-Rapid City).

CHICAGO (AP) — Grain futures were mostly lower Tuesday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for December delivery was off 8.50 cents to \$4.9950 a bushel; December corn fell 3.50 cents to 3.77 a bushel; December oats lost 1.50 cents to 2.1925 a bushel; while November soybeans gained 3.75 cents to \$8.7775 bushel.

Beef mixed and pork higher on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. October live cattle was off .62 cent to \$1.4170 a pound; October feeder cattle was up .85 cent to \$1.9575 a pound; while October lean hogs rose 1.68 cents to \$6.750 a pound.

WALL ST. RECAP

U.S. stocks closed lower on Tuesday after falling sharply in the final hour of trading. Stocks had surged early, rebounding from a big sell-off a day before, after the Chinese central bank said it was cutting interest rates to shore up its economy. But the rally faded, extending the market's losing streak to six days.
