Berkshire Buys World-Herald Co. For \$150M

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) - Warren Buffett's Berkshire Hathaway said Wednesday that it is buying the Omaha World-Herald Co. and expanding the firm's newspaper holdings despite Buffett's misgivings about the industry.

Buffett told the World-Herald that Berkshire agreed to pay \$150 million cash and assume \$50 million in debt to acquire the newspaper he's been reading since he was a child.

The deal must be approved by the Omaha World-*Herald's* employee owners and other shareholders and also includes daily newspapers the company owns in Council Bluffs, Iowa, and Grand Island, York, Kearney, North Platte and Scottsbluff in Nebraska.

Buffett did not immediately respond to an interview request Wednesday. Berkshire's chairman and chief executive previously has said he would be unlikely to add to Berkshire's newspaper investments because of the industry's dwindling returns. Berkshire owns the Buffalo News and it has a sizable investment in the Washington Post Co.

Buffett told Berkshire shareholders two years ago that most newspapers face the possibility of unending

GOP Bill Would Force Action On XL Oil Pipeline

WASHINGTON - Angered by President Barack Obama's delay of a proposed oil pipeline from Canada, Senate Republicans are moving to force him to act.

A bill introduced Wednesday by 37 GOP senators, including Senate Minority Leader Mitch McConnell, would require the administration to approve the Keystone XL pipeline within 60 days, unless the president declares the project is not

in the national interest. The State Department decided on Nov. 10 to delay the project until 2013, after the presidential election, to allow the project's developer to figure out a way around Nebraska's Sandhills, an ecologically sensitive region that supplies water

to eight nearby states. McConnell, R-Ky., called the \$7 billion pipeline the ultimate "shovel-ready" project and said it could create as many as

20.000 jobs. He and other Republicans called Obama's decision to delay the project transparently political and said Obama had put his reelection above job creation. "This is politics, pure and simple,"

said Sen. Lisa Murkowski, R-Alaska. The GOP bill has little chance of approval in the Democratic-controlled Senate. But the measure illustrates Republicans' frustration over the pipeline delay and their belief that Obama is vulnerable on the jobs issue.

House Republicans are expected to highlight the jobs issue again on Friday, during a hearing before the Energy and Commerce Committee on the pipeline project. Several labor union leaders are among those scheduled to testify.

The pipeline project has divided labor groups eager for the jobs it would create from environmentalists and other traditional Democratic allies who oppose the pipeline as an ecological disaster waiting to happen.

The 1,700-mile pipeline proposed by Calgary-based TransCanada would carry as much as 700,000 barrels of oil a day from tar sands in Alberta, Canada, to refineries in Texas, passing through Montana, South Dakota, Kansas, Nebraska and Oklahoma.

Supporters say it could significantly reduce U.S. dependence on Middle Eastern oil while providing thousands of jobs Opponents say the pipeline would bring "dirty oil" that requires huge amounts of energy to extract. They also worry about possible spills, noting that a current pipeline operated by TransCanada has had several spills in the past year.

The Senate bill's chief sponsor. Richard Lugar of Indiana, said Keystone XL presented a dramatic opportunity to boost U.S. national security and North

base," Lugar said. White House spokesman Josh Earnest

called that criticism off-base. "I recognize that there are people in Washington, D.C., who want to apply a political label to every single thing that the president or other members of this administration do, but at the end of the day this is a decision that falls cleanly in line with the priorities that the president laid out" in a recent interview, Earnest said.

Obama told a Nebraska TV station that he needed to balance job creation and energy security with public health and the safety of communities along the pipeline route.

The bill's supporters include Sen. Mike Johanns, R-Neb., who had opposed an earlier plan that would have routed the pipeline through the Nebraska Sandhills, a region of porous hills that includes a high concentration of wetlands and a key aquifer.

The State Department cited the Sandhills as a key reason to delay the project. The State Department has authority over the project because it crosses a U.S. border. After the delay was announced, TransCanada agreed to divert the pipeline around the Sandhills, although an exact route has not been determined.

Last week, Nebraska Gov. Dave Heineman signed two laws aimed at oil pipelines, including one that requires state officials to conduct an environmental review of Keystone XL.

Johanns said the Senate bill would allow construction of the pipeline to begin in all states except Nebraska, where construction would be put off until an acceptable route is found and all required reviews are completed.

'The issues in Nebraska have been resolved," Johanns said, adding that the White House should not hide behind concern over the Sandhills as a reason to delay the project further.

Nebraska's other senator, Democrat Ben Nelson, called the GOP bill "well intentioned" but unnecessary. He said state officials have worked out a "good compromise" with TransCanada and the State Department that should be allowed to continue.

"If something goes awry, I can look at legislation at that time," he told reporters Wednesday.

Neb. Seeks \$16M For Flood Damage To Roads

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) - Nebraska says this year's flooding along the Missouri and Platte rivers caused about \$20 million damage to roads, and the state is asking the federal government to pick up most of the tab.

The Nebraska Department of Roads has submitted a report to the Federal Highway Administration for \$16.6 million. That would cover the damage to federal aid routes, which include interstates, highways and some county roads.

The Lincoln Journal Star says state officials say the request is the largest ever made by the roads department for flood damage to roads.

Most of the damaged roads were in Knox, Cedar, Washington, Douglas, Cass, Otoe, Nemaha and Richardson counties along the Missouri River.

Sex Assault Charges Dropped Against Suspect

AUBURN, Neb. (AP) — Charges against a man accused of raping a Peru State College student and suspected in the disappearance of another have been dropped.

The Lincoln Journal Star reports that eight Nemaha County charges, including sexual assault and weapon use, against Joshua Keadle were dropped Wednesday following a hearing on new evidence in the case. Keadle's trial was to have begun Monday.

The hearing centered on 38 pages of Facebook messages from the alleged rape victim to Keadle. County Attorney Louie Ligouri argued he should be able to see Keadle's replies and asked for the trial to be postponed. Following a recess, Ligouri's request to dismiss the charges was granted.

Neither Ligouri nor Keadle's defense attorney could immediately be reached for comment Wednesday.

Keadle still faces rape charges in Dodge County.

IRS Has 207 Undelivered Checks To S.D.

SIOUX FALLS (AP) — The Internal Revenue Service has more than \$500,000 in checks it has been unable to deliver to individuals.

The IRS says in a news release that \$559,497 worth of checks could not be delivered to 207 filers in South Dakota because of mailing address errors.

Taxpayers may check the list of filers by using the "Where's My Re-fund" tool on IRS.gov or calling (800) 829-1954.

Authorities ID Human Remains Found In S.D.

RAPID CITY (AP) - Authorities say human remains found off Iron Mountain Road in the Black Hills in March have been identified as a 61year-old Keystone-area man.

The Pennington County Sheriff's Office says reports from a crime lab in Texas show the remains are consistent with those of Michael Berry. Officials identified the remains using DNA from a relative of Berry's.

Officials have closed the investigation and Berry's family has been notified.

Dakotas Excel In Funding Smoking Programs

BISMARCK, N.D. (AP) - North Dakota is ranked second in the nation and South Dakota eighth in the funding of programs to prevent youths from smoking and to help smokers quit.

The annual rankings were released Wednesday by a coalition of public health groups including the Campaign for Tobacco-Free Kids and the American Cancer Society. The report says North Dakota spends \$9.3 million a year on tobacco prevention and cessation programs, and South Dakota spends \$4 million.

States overall will collect \$25.6 billion in tobacco taxes and legal settlements from the tobacco industry this year but will spend less than 2 percent of it on programs to prevent or stop tobacco use. The report says North Dakota will spend about 14 percent of its tobacco money for those purposes, and South Dakota will spend about 5 percent.

Man Sentenced For Sex Assault On 5-Year-Old

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) - A Lincoln man who sexually assaulted a 5year-old girl he was babysitting will receive up to 45 years in prison.

The Lincoln Journal Star reports that Joshua Voight was sentenced Tuesday to 35 to 45 years behind bars.

The 36-year-old Voight pleaded no contest in October to first-degree sexual assault of a minor. Voight was arrested in May after the girl told her mother and investigators about the abuse.

Lancaster County District Court Judge Jodi Nelson ordered Voight to register as a sex offender after he is released from prison. He will be eligible for parole in about 17 years. Nelson called the crime disgusting and chastised Nelson for abusing his role as a baby sitter.

Kroeger, who is the World-*Herald's* CEO, said this deal will help the newspaper raise needed capital. He said the company's employee-ownership structure was restrictive and forced the World-Herald to repurchase stock from departing employees.

Sentenced To 3 Years

PIERRE (AP) — A former Crow Creek Sioux tribal chairman was sentenced to three years in prison Wednesday for a scheme in which tribal officials were rewarded for giving contracts to construction companies for buildings at the tribe's central South Dakota school.

A federal jury in August convicted Duane Big Eagle, 62, on two counts of conspiracy to bribe a tribal official and one count of briberv.

Big Eagle had asked to be sentenced to a year of house arrest and repayment of \$21,500 to the tribe, but U.S. District Court Judge Roberto A. Lange said Wednesday that the nature of the crime required that Big Eagle serve time in prison.

"The court wants to appropriately punish Mr. Big Eagle for what has occurred and deter anyone from similar conduct," Lange said.

The charges relate to tribal officials' actions in awarding a \$3.5 million contract to build a new dorm and kitchen facility after a 2005 at the tribal school and later contracts to build housing at the school.
