and physicians who told us that the most important aspect of our layout for efficiency would be to have all the clinical services on the first floor. That is why we are having the laboratory and radiology, surgery right next to the Intensive Care Unit and Emergency Department. Those are all adjacent to each other and will be much more efficient."

The surgery expansion which will be completed in July 2012 is just finishing the second of two

According to Ekeren there will soon be six new surgery rooms with the first to go into operation next month.

The first phase was the new pre- and post-op rooms, recovery, nurses station and physician

locker rooms, which opened up July of this summer," he said. "We are now in the second phase, which is building and equipping four of the new operating rooms. Three of them do come on-line just after the first of the year, a fourth about 45 days after that. Once those are completed, we will begin on the other two and limited support spaces.'

The third floor of the Northern Light's expansion will be used for a new pharmacy.

'Our pharmacy and biomedical services currently share spaces on the third floor of the hospital and really, there is only room for one of them," Ekeren said. "So we think the best option for us is to leave all the computer folks where they are at, build a new pharmacy, and let the biomedical services expand into the space that the pharmacy vacates.'

Ekeren said the target completion for the Northern Lights project is approximately 24 months.




