INDIANAPOLIS — Newly-named Indianapolis Colts defensive coordinator Mike Murphy got his coaching start

Murphy, a New York native, played at and graduated from Huron College, and began his coaching career at Woonsocket High School. After four years in the prep ranks, he moved on to the University of Vermont in 1970, then made stops at Idaho State and Western Illinois before joining the professional ranks with the Saskatchewan Roughriders of the Canadian Football League.

He spent one season with the Chicago Blitz of the USFL before beginning his NFL career with the Detroit Lions in 1985. He has also been with the Arizona Cardinals, Carolina Panthers and Seattle Seahawks before joining the Colts as the team's linebackers coach 14 years ago.

# **Son Of Former YC Coach Up For National Honors**

MINNEAPOLIS — University of Dubuque wide receiver Michael Zweifel, the son of former Yankton College coach Stan Zweifel, is up for several top national honors.

Michael Zweifel is the only Division III candidate for the prestigious William V. Campbell Trophy, given to the Amer-

ican college football player with the best combination of academics, community service and on-field performance, considered by many to be the "Academic Heisman." University of South Dakota running back Chris Ganious is also a finalist for this award.

Zweifel was also an Allstate Good Works Team finalist and a Capital One Academic All-Region VIII First-team selection in 2011.

On the field, Zweifel is one of 10 finalists for the Gagliardi Trophy, given to the most outstanding player in NCAA Division III. He led all NCAA divisions this season ith 12.7 receptions and 178 yards per game, as well as 24 receiving touchdowns, setting a Division III record with 140 catches. He led Dubuque to its first lowa Intercollegiate Athletic Conference title in 31 years, and ranks second on the all-time receiving yards list (all divisions) with 5.979 vards.

He was also named the IIAC Offensive Player of the Year, with his coach and father named the league's Coach

ST. LOUIS — South Dakota State running back Tyrel Kool was one of several Jackrabbits honored as the Missouri Valley Football Conference announced its all-aca-

Kool, a junior from Yankton, led the Jackrabbits in rushing with 534 yards and four touchdowns during the 2011 season. He has turned in a 3.22 GPA while majoring in business economics.

Nominees must be starters or important reserves with at least a 3.20 cumulative grade-point average. Studentathletes must have reached sophomore academic and athletic standing at their institutions and must have completed at least one full academic year at their institution. A total of 40 players were recognized on the first, second or honorable mention squads.

The Jackrabbits have led the Missouri Valley Football Conference in number of all-academic team selections in each of their four seasons (2008-11) as a member of the league. Previously, SDSU led the GreatWest Football Conference in all-academic honorees from 2005-07.

# **Sioux Falls Lincoln's Schultz Earns Gatorade Honor**

CHICAGO — Sioux Falls Lincoln quarterback Alex Schultz has been named the 2011-12 Gatorade South Dakota Player of the Year.

Schultz is the first-ever Patriot football player to receive the honor, which recognizes athletic excellence, academic achievement and exemplary character on and off the field. He passed for 2,991 yards and 36 touchdowns, leading Lincoln to a state semifinal berth. The two-time first team
