People are buying more cars. The holiday shopping season is off to a strong start. Normally, all that would suggest a

Concerns about a credit crunch led the Federal Reserve and five other central banks to take coordinated action this week to lower the cost of dollar loans in Europe and elsewhere.

Vitner said he thinks employers want to see stronger customer demand and economic growth before they step up hiring — rather than hire in anticipation of it.

That could turn into a vicious circle. Without more jobs and higher incomes, consumers won't spend more. Yet without more spending, companies won't increase their payrolls.

Vitner expects growth to pick up to 3.1 percent in the current October-December quarter, but then fall back to about 2 percent in 2012. A recession in Europe could cut up to 0.4 percentage point off next year's growth, he said.

The manufacturing survey also showed that new orders and production rose to a seven-month high, but a measure of employment fell as factory hiring slowed from the previous month.

NEW YORK — Oil prices ended slightly lower Thursday after a fourday surge, as traders await a key U.S. jobs report.

Benchmark crude fell 16 cents to finish at \$100.20 per barrel in New York. Brent crude lost \$1.27 to end the day at \$108.71 in London. Prices had risen every trading day

In other energy trading, natural gas prices jumped 9.8 cents, or 2.8 percent, to end at \$3.648 per 1,000 cubic feet, after the government reported an unexpected decline in U.S. supplies last week.

Israeli Defense Chief Says Iran Strike May Be Needed

JERUSALEM — Israel does not want to take military action against Iran over its nuclear program, but at some point may have no other option, Israel's defense minister said Thursday.

At this point, Israel does not intend to launch a strike against Iranian nuclear facilities but it retains the option as a "last resort." Defense Minister Ehud Barak told Israel "We don't need unnecessary wars. But we definitely

might be put to the test," he said. "The non-diplomatic point is a last resort. The fact that all options are on the table is agreed upon by everybody.' Barak said he hoped that sanctions and diplomacy

would pressure the Iranian leadership to abandon its suspected nuclear weapons program, but said he does not expect that to happen. Israel, like the West, suspects Iran is developing a nuclear bomb, despite Tehran's insistence that its nuclear

program is designed to produce energy. Israel says a nuclear-armed Iran would threaten the Jewish state's survival, citing Iranian President Mahmoud Ahmadinejad's repeated references to Israel's destruction, Iran's arsenal of ballistic missiles and its support for militant groups that fight Israel.

The U.S. — as well as some security experts in Israel have loudly opposed the prospect of an Israeli military strike against Iranian nuclear facilities, because of its potential for touching off retaliation against Israel and a broader, regional conflagration.

But Barak suggested that Israel might not alert world powers before embarking on a strike.

"Israel is a sovereign state and it is the government of Israel, the Israeli army and security forces who are responsible for Israel's security, future and survival," he said.

Measles Outbreaks On The Rise Across Europe

LONDON (AP) - After years of decline, measles is on the rise in Europe, according to a new report released Thursday. As of October, European health officials reported more

than 26,000 measles cases this year and nine deaths.

That's a threefold increase in cases from the same time period in 2007, said the World Health Organization. France accounted for about 14,000 cases, mainly in children older than five and in young adults. Other big outbreaks of the highly-contagious disease have been identified in Spain, Romania, Macedonia, and

Uzbekistan. So far, measles has killed nine people in Europe and hospitalized thousands of others. The report was published Thursday by the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. We are seeing a surge of cases much larger than we've seen in the past five or six years," said Rebecca Martin,
