# THE BOOK SHELF A Breezy Look At Young Ben Franklin



How hard do you have to work at home? Do you clean your room? Empty the dishwasher? Carry the trash out? In 1721 children were often sold as indentured servants at a young age, required to work for someone in exchange for food and a roof over their heads. After about seven years, they would be free to do as they choose.

Seven years is a long time if the master is unkind. Fourteen-year-old Patience Martin is an indentured household servant to Mrs. Worth, an ill-tempered, miserly, harsh woman. Patience cooks her meals, cleans the house, does all the laundry (no washing machine or dryer!), and carries in the wood, along with anything Mrs. Worth can think of for Patience to do. Mrs. Worth has no sympathy for Patience, even though Patience's father died onboard the same ship as Mrs. Worth's husband.

When Mrs. Worth becomes sick, she sends Patience to fetch Moll Bacon, a midwife. Moll does her best to make Mrs. Worth comfortable, including asking Patience to make a special tea. When Moll leaves that evening, Mrs. Worth is feeling well enough to order Patience to drag out her money box so she can count her money.

When Mrs. Worth isn't up by noon the



next day, Patience becomes concerned. She can't rouse Mrs. Worth by pounding on the locked door, so she runs for the doctor. He picks up a boy along the way to climb a ladder into Mrs. Worth's room. The boy's name is Ben Franklin. He quickly climbs into the room and comes out looking like he's seen a ghost, which he sort of has. Well, a dead body anyway. Mrs. Worth is dead.

Patience feels bad, but never had much affection for Mrs. Worth because of the cruel way Mrs. Worth treated her. Patience's biggest concern now is what will happen to her. Mrs. Worth's brother-in-law inherits Patience's indenture. He wastes no time declaring that he intends to sell her at a low price to someone who he hopes is nasty to her, as he's never liked Patience. The thought of four years with a master who will treat her as less than an animal, doing who knows what to her, is unbearable. Patience runs away, and seeks out the only person who might help her - the boy, Ben, who climbed in the window.

When the doctor announces that Mrs. Worth was poisoned with arsenic, Moll Bacon is arrested for murder. When Mrs. Worth's money box turns up missing, Patience is sus-pected as the thief. Patience knows Moll is too kind and gentle to have killed anyone. She decides she must prove Moll's innocence as well as her own. But how can a girl in hiding do that, even with the help of a boy named Ben?

This historical fiction book is well-written with a storyline that will keep you guessing. It gives an interesting glimpse into young Ben Franklin's character at a young age, before he did all the things he is known for. Patience's courage and determination will have you rooting for her from the beginning.

For ages 8-12, you won't have to work hard at all to breeze through this book.
