Naturally, I was curious. The subject was obvious; something was happening in the University of South Dakota's ongoing search for a new head football coach.

A few messages later, and after ones from two others, I figured it out: It was going to be Joe Glenn. It hasn't been made official by USD, but you can expect a formal announcement today (Monday) in Vermillion to name the 62-year-old Glenn the newest Coyote coach.

Expected Hire Of Joe Glenn An Interesting — And Bold — Move

Slice it however you want, it's an interesting — and bold — move. Glenn is a former USD player and 1971 graduate who went on to win three national championships in his

24 years as a head coach at Doane, Northern Colorado, Montana and Wyoming It seems perhaps fitting that a USD program that sought a new direction would hand the reins to an alumnus. Glenn is certainly no stranger to the Coyote community (he is already in the athletic Hall of Fame, for one)

and will bring instant excitement to a team that begins Missouri Valley Football Conference play next fall Some will argue that Glenn hasn't coached in three years since being fired by Wyoming in 2008, and that

he hasn't been on the recruiting trail — especially in this area.

Though, he is certainly a nice "get" by athletic director David Sayler, who said last week that the coaching vacancy had brought "high" interest — with at least 40 resumes having been submitted.
