In the year beginning July 1. The portion from state general tax funds would exceed \$1.2 billion. That's an increase of about \$93 million in ongoing spending, but that includes replacing about \$37 million in federal stimulus money with state funds for education.

State general tax collections are expected to rise \$63 million in the next two years, and that money will be used to pay for ongoing spending increases in the next budget year, the governor said. Another \$40 million in increased spending would be one-time payments over two years that would not be built into ongoing spending for education, medical care and other programs.

Leaders of the Democratic minority in the Legislature said the budget cuts imposed in the current year were excessive, and the governor's proposed budget for next year fails to provide a long-term plan for funding schools and health care.

"The question is how are we going to rebuild from this base, and the governor didn't really talk about that," House Democratic Leader Bernie Hunhoff of Yankton said.

But Senate Republican Leader Russell Olson of Wentworth said the governor's speech shows South Dakota is on the right track because the budget is now balanced and any future revenue growth can be targeted to improve education and other priorities.

After Daugaard took office in January, he proposed a 10 percent cut in nearly every state agency to balance this year's budget. His original plan called for 10 percent cuts in state aid to schools and Medicaid providers, but the governor and Legislature found extra money to give schools and health care providers a one-time bonus that reduced the size of the cuts to 6.6 percent in the current year.

A state law that has been suspended for the past two years calls for state aid to school districts to increase each year by the previous year's rate of inflation, up to a maximum of 3 percent. The governors' proposed budget, which is based on the inflation rate, would give school districts a 2.3 percent boost in ongoing state aid, amounting to \$9.8 million next year. Schools would get another 0.7 percent increase in the form of a one-time bonus of nearly \$4 million to help them pay operating expenses.

A recent U.S. Census Bureau report said South Dakota ranked 44th in the nation in 2009 in spending per student in kindergarten through 12th grade, but state officials have said that did not take into account South Dakota's lower cost of living.

Daugaard also recommended that the state spend more than \$8.4 million, equal to a 1.5 percent boost in school aid, to train teachers and administrators to use the new Common Core curriculum standards developed by a coalition of states for math and English.

Reimbursements to nursing homes and other facilities that serve Medicaid patients would increase by 1.8 percent, at a cost of nearly \$6.2 million, on an ongoing basis to account for expected inflation next year. One-time bonuses of about \$9.1 million, equal to a 2.7 percent boost, also would be given to Medicaid providers.

The state's university system would get an ongoing increase of 0.9 percent costing \$1.4 million, with another 3.6 percent in one-time payments totaling \$5.9 million. South Dakota's four technical schools also would get a mix of ongoing and one-time money.

The 3 percent across-the-board pay raises for state employees, combined with increases in health insurance costs and other adjustments, would cost \$12.4 million in state general funds next year, while the one-time bonus of 5 percent of each employee's salary would cost more than \$12 million and be paid in the current budget year.
