# **Lincoln First Graders Learn About The Flag**

Lincoln Elementary School First grade teacher Carla Hacaecky recently invited The Society of 40 Men and 8 Horses to present their Flags for First Graders Program.

All the First Graders recited the Pledge of Allegiance to the U.S. Flag. All of them knew the words and understood what they mean.

Voyageurs (members of the 40 & 8) Preston Olson and Bob Bender showed and explained how to display the U. S. Flag properly. Like it should always fly even or higher than other flags, never lower. Never display at night unless it is illuminated. Never display a torn or dirty flag. A flag may be shortened a little and repaired, it can also be washed if soiled. The U.S. Flag should always be to the right as you look away from it with any and all other flags to the left.

We show proper respect to the U.S. Flag by standing at attention and placing our right hand over our heart when it passes by in a parade, when we say the Pledge of Allegiance and when our National Anthem is performed we face the Flag and do the same thing. We never talk or look around when the National Anthem (The Star Spangle Banner) is being performed. We learn not to let it touch the ground, the floor or other objects and nerver place anything on it. It is not just a piece or many pieces of material, it is a living flag and we need to always protect and honor it.As we showed them how to fold a flag properly we explained each folds meaning, wanting them to remember the sixth fold as it where our hearts lie. It is with our heart that we pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America and to the republic for which it stands, one nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all. The 7th fold is a tribute to our Armed Forces, the 8th fold is to honor Mother, for whom it flies on Mother Day and the 10th fold a tribute to fathers. When completely folded the flag takes on the appearance of a cocked hat and reminds us

of the soldiers who served under George Washington.

As all the First Graders knew and understood the Pledge of Allegiance, they all received a certificate stating such and a 4" X 6" U.S. Flag and a stand. All of them also received a coloring book, information on the Box car the people of South Dakota received in 1949 full of gifts from the people of France, saying thanks for saving their country which is on exhibit at the State Fair grounds in Huron and which the Forty and Eight Voyageurs take care of for the people of South Dakota and a Flag information sheet.
