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It's only fitting that Rob Klimisch got

After all, it was essentially his idea to add women's tennis at Mount Marty Col-

"You see all those girls going to other schools, and it makes you think, 'We should have a tennis program right here in town,'" said Klimisch, who Friday was named the head coach of the women's program that begins competition at MMC next fall.

"That's all it took. I went to (athletic director) Chuck Iverson and basically said, 'Yóu should think about adding ́

So began the process that materialized on Nov. 16, when Mount Marty announced it would become the ninth Great Plains Athletic Conference school to sponsor the sport. Three weeks later, the NAIA school has its coach.

Klimisch, who also serves as the

the perfect example. I'm getting old, but I still play it and still enjoy it. "That's what I try to pass on to kids all the time, that literally anybody can

It was that energy, coupled with his knowledge of the area tennis scene, that made Klimisch an ideal candidate among a small pool of applicants, Iver-

son said. "His background, in a variety of ways, is really impressive, especially when we thought about starting a new program,"

Iverson said. "He has a lot of contacts;

knows a lot of people.

"He's been around in a few summer tournaments, and those coaches and players he knows might be very useful in the recruiting process.

The average number of athletes among GPAC schools with tennis is nine, so a range of 8-11 recruits is what Klimisch will start with in his journey.

"The idea of having to go recruit isn't something completely foreign to me. I know a lot of the players across the state, not to mention their parents," he said. "Even (Friday), I've been making phone calls to whoever I can think of,

just to get our name out there.' From there, hopefully the interest will pick up, Iverson said.

"Once Rob gets on campus and starts talking with people, hopefully more people start thinking about it," he said. Maybe a student already here, who was a former athlete, might consider it, but our focus is recruiting new student-athletes to campus."

To that end, the process will natu-

rally start in Yankton and branch out

Yankton has had no shortage of girls' tennis players sign with college programs — including recent standouts Melanie Rockne (University of South Dakota), Gabbie Kachena (Augustana) and Bridget Henderson (Northern

Klimisch was not shy in saying he will try to persuade his daughter, Lexie, to consider playing at Mount Marty. Lexie, a senior for YHS this past season, recorded 123 career singles wins in her career, which ranks among the best in school history.

The same goes for fellow Yankton senior Vanessa Rockne, who ranks first in all-time wins at YHS.

"That's kind of how the idea for tennis (at MMC) started," Rob Klimisch said. "There's always been great local support for our athletes, and if we could keep them close to home, that'd be

Though he is starting literally from

scratch, Klimisch did say he has plans next week to criss-cross the state in an attempt to lure potential recruits. He listed a handful of cities that have found recent success in tennis, which he

hopes translates to the college level. That's one of the most exciting parts, is that whatever program is created is my program," Klimisch said. "That's exciting to put it together the way you want, and bring in the right

kind of kids." Because, at the end of the day, that was what his initial idea was all about.

"It took me two times that convince Chuck that it would be a good idea to take it to the Board (of Trustees)," Klimisch said. "Chuck did a great job with the groundwork; all I did was bring up the idea. He had to work out the budgets, talking to other schools; all those lo-

"But I'm glad it worked out," he added. "I'm just excited to get started."

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In almost every measurable fashion, the Yankton Gazelles started their season the way they

The Gazelles used a dominating first half and a balanced scoring effort to rout Brookings 55-31 in Friday night's season opener at the Summit Activities Center.

Yet, it could prove to be a costly victory for Yankton.

The Gazelles lost two key players to injury — senior reserve Audrey Fuks (knee) in the first quarter and junior starter Mikala Hora (shoulder) in the "In the first game, you think

you know what you have until you get out there, then you see things you have to figure things out," said Yankton coach Doug Pesicka.

'Getting the win is important, no matter how it happens, so I thought it was nice to start like

Emily Fedders led Yankton with a game-high 12 points and four assists, while Chloe Cornemann added 10 points and Hora chipped in with seven.

Sure, the Gazelles got 42 points from their starters, but the one-sided outcome was based mostly on Yankton's suffocating defense.

Brookings (0-2) made only two field goals in the first half, getting eight points at the free throw

"One of the things we said before the game was, 'Lets get out and defend and guard without fouling," Pesicka said. "Defensively we caused some problems, but we have to clean up the rebounds.

Fedders scored six points in the first quarter, but it wasn't so much the Yankton offense as it was the defense.

Brookings was held to only one field goal — and four free throws — in the opening quarter, yet by that time the Gazelles already led 12-6. Hora's fastbreak layup with 1:02 to go put Yankton up 14-6 after one.

Life only got worse for Brookings in the second quarter.

Yankton reeled off nine straight points to lead 24-6 before the Bobcats scored again — on free throws. The nine-minute field goal drought ended with 29 seconds left before halftime.

Cornemann's runner with 10 seconds left took the Gazelles into halftime with a 28-12 cushIn that opening half, Yankton shot 52.6 percent from the field and played at a pace that seemed to frustrate the visiting Bobcats. "The thing about us right now

is that we want to run, but a few times we got in too big of a hurry," Pesicka said. Brookings was able to score

two field goals in the third quarter, but was still unable to slow down the Gazelles. Yankton closed the frame on an 8-2 run to lead 41-16 after three quarters. Brookings was able to find

some sort of rhythm in the fourth quarter, but the Gazelles — with mostly reserves late — continued to roll. Yankton's largest lead was 51-

22 on a jumper by Cornemann with 4:57 to play. The Bobcats wouldn't get much closer from Brookings was led by Kaitlin

Kwasniewski and Racheal Mielke, who both scored six points.

Free throws were one area that Pesicka later said needs work — the Gazelles were 20-of-35 at the charity stripe.

The second scare of the night, however, came when Hora left with the shoulder injury - suffered away from the ball. She later returned to the bench.

Fuks' injury looks to be the most severe, Pesicka said.

We're just hoping and praying, keeping our fingers crossed for her," he said. "Audrey has fought and clawed and dreamt about coming back from an ACL injury, so hopefully it's a quick recovery."

Yankton travels to Sioux Falls for a matchup with Washington next Tuesday night at 7:30 p.m.
