RG3, Heisman Finalists Weary, Still Rarin' To Go

was working on about 4 1-2 hours' sleep after catching an early flight from Florida to New York on Friday.

Not that he was complaining. Griffin will trade sleep deprivation for a chance to bring No. 15 Baylor its first Heisman Tro-

phy any day.

"This is what it is if you're going to play well and your team is doing great things," he said shortly after taking his seat at a cameras in a hotel conference room. "People are going to want to talk to you, they're going to want a piece of you. It's exciting."

The Bears' thrilling dual-threat quarterback was one four Heisman finalists to arrive in New York on Friday afternoon, along with LSU defensive back Tyrann Mathieu and running backs Trent Richard-son of Alabama and Montee Ball from Wis-

Stanford quarterback Andrew Luck was in Baltimore receiving the Johnny Unitas Award and was scheduled to arrive in Manhattan on Saturday morning, about 12 hours before the Heisman will be pre-

Griffin and the other finalists came

straight from the college football award shows in Orlando, Fla., on Thursday night, where he picked up the Davey O'Brien award as the nation's best quarterback.

Luck entered the season as the clearcut Heisman front-runner after turning down a chance to be the first pick in the NFL draft to return to Stanford for one

He was excellent, passing for 3,170 yards and 35 touchdowns for BCS-bound

But on the way to what seemed like an enviable Heisman victory, RG3 zoomed past Luck with a memorable closing month, highlighted by victories against Oklahoma and Texas.

'After the Oklahoma game all the players on the team realized that if we won out and we did it in style ... we'd be here," he said. "I say we'd be here because that's who I'm here for. I am here for those guys.

The Texas game was probably the most pressure we had all year to win a game. And we did it in convincing fash-

Griffin and the Bears beat Texas 48-24 on Saturday in Waco, Texas, to finish the season 9-3, Baylor's first nine-win season

in 25 years. Lifting Baylor from the doldrums — along with passing for 3,998 yards and 36 touchdowns — is a big part of why Griffin is expected to break a Heisman trend on Saturday night.

Seven of the last eight winners, including Reggie Bush who later vacated the title, played in the BCS national championship game, like Mathieu and Richardson will. The Southeastern Conference rivals meet again Jan. 9 in New Orleans.

"It was a slugfest out there," Richardson said about LSU's 9-6 overtime victory in November. "I can't wait for this re-

The recent exception to the BCS title game-Heisman connection was Tim Tebow, who won it in 2007 playing for a Florida team that finished the regular season 9-3.

Griffin has some of that Tebow magnetism: good looks, a bright smile, comfortable in front of the camera and adored by

He's not quite Tebow-famous, but he's no longer just a regional star.

"To be in Orlando and have guys screaming, 'RG3!' and 'Sic'em Bears,' that's amazing," he said. "Baylor fans are every-

Luck and Griffin are both from Texas and were in the same 2008 recruiting class. They could have formed a dynamic quarterback duo at Stanford.

Griffin said he took his only recruiting trip to Stanford and loved the campus. Then-Cardinal coach Jim Harbaugh pitched a two-quarterback system to Griffin, in which Griffin would share the job with Luck.

Griffin was skeptical so he committed to Houston instead, then switched to Baylor when coach Art Briles left the Cougars for Waco, Texas.

"I decided to do what was best for me," Griffin said.

It worked out well for Luck, too. He figures to be the first overall pick in the NFL

Bubu Palo chipped in with a career-high 14 points for Iowa State (7-3), which last won three in a row over the rival Hawkeyes from 1983-

White had 14 points in the first half, when the Cyclones led by as many as 24. Iowa got as close as 13 midway through the second half, but Iowa State pulled away behind Christopherson to give Fred Hoiberg his fifth win in six tries over Iowa as a player and coach.

Devyn Marble scored a careerhigh 21 points to lead the Hawkeyes (5-5), who've lost five of their last seven to drop to .500.

On the night the Bucks shot 45 percent overall (23-51), including 55 percent from behind the three point line (6-11), but costly mental errors led to a 68-56 defeat.

Jackson Seitzinger led the Bucks with 19points on 8-17 shooting, including 3-5 from behind the three point line. Kellen Soulek ended the game with 13 points and six rebounds on 6-11 shooting. Yankton also held Brookings to 39 percent shooting on the night (20-51) and only 27 percent from the three point line (6-22) That was the good that the Bucks were able to showcase in their season opener.

"I thought we shot the ball pretty darn well from two point and from three point," Coach Randy Gross said.

The bad that Yankton displayed included 18 team turnovers, and 23 total fouls. Two Bucks players, Jackson Pasco and Soulek, fouled out of the game. Seitzinger and Bryan Youngberg each committed four fouls. The barrage of fouls sent the Brookings Bobcats to the line 34 times. Brookings shot 22-34 from the line, not an overly impressive percentage, but Yankton only made four free throws all game. The 18 point difference in free throws was enough to

The big key in the game was getting to the free throw line," Gross said. "If I had to pick one thing that led to the loss it would be letting them shoot 34 free throws and us only getting to the line seven times
