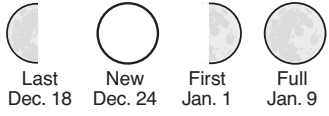

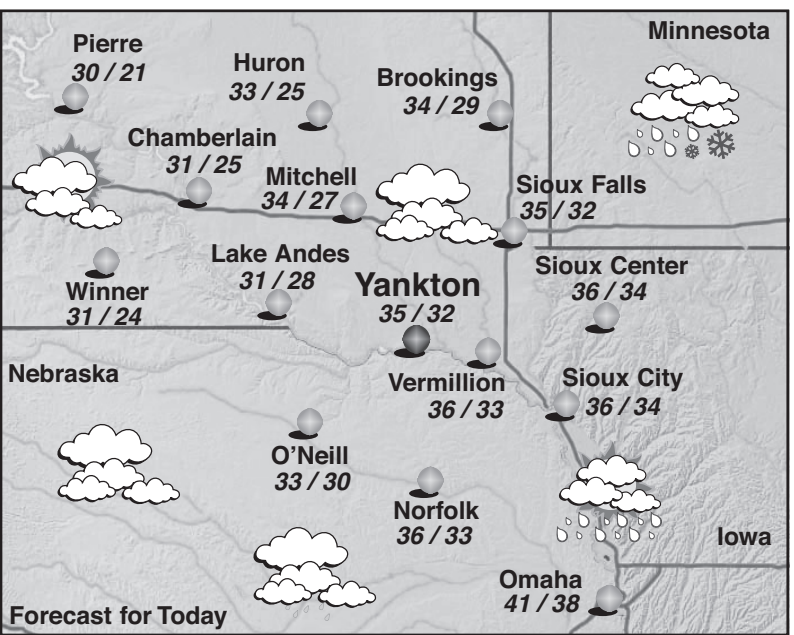

Wheat for March delivery fell 1.75 cent to \$5.9425 a bushel; March corn fell 0.25 cent to \$5.94 a bushel; March oats rose 4.75 cents to \$3.0675 a bushel; and January soybeans rose 5

cents to \$11.12 a bushel.
Beef and pork futures rose on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.
February live cattle rose 0.20 cent to \$1.1865 a pound; January feeder cattle rose 0.90 cent to \$1.43 a pound; while February lean hogs rose 0.18 cent to 86.60 cents a pound.

• An early morning shotgun blast shattered the rear window and the side windows, punctured the right rear tire and left some 37 pellet holes in a 1960 Oldsmobile 88 four-door Holiday model in a shooting incident a short distance east of the city limits at about 1:30 this morning.
• Three districts are set up in the master plan which the Yankton county board of education has voted to submit to the state department of public instruction by January 1, 1962. This will meet the deadline in the reorganization law. Divisions 1 and 3 will be independent districts, including high schools at

Yankton and Irene. Division 2 will be a common school district.

• Officials from Yankton College are continuing to work with a Virginia real estate developer for funds to reopen the college. Jim Mitchell, an Omaha attorney representing the college in its bankruptcy proceedings, said Friday that he would not comment on the negotiations involving William Smyth except to say that efforts to raise \$3.1 million to reopen the college are continuing.
