**GFWC GIVES BACK**

Tom Brokaw is probably the most wellknown South Dakotan. He certainly is the most trusted and respected figure in broadcast journalism.

On Dec. 1, 2004, Brokaw stepped down after 21 years as the anchor and managing editor of "NBC Nightly News." He has received many honors not only for his on-air appearances; but also as a best-selling author of such books as "The Greatest Generation," won the Edward R. Murrow Lifetime Achievement Award and many others. He earned a dozen Emmys and two Peabody and DuPont awards for his journalistic achievements.

I interviewed him at a "Lincoln Portrait" press conference recently in Eugene, Oregon. e charmed the press from all over this area with stories about his roots in South Dakota, where he said, "I was taught the values that have served me well in my work around the world."

Most recently he served as moderator of NBC's top-rated Sunday morning public af-fairs program "Meet the Press," after the

#### untimely death of Tim Russert.

Tom said his mother was born and grew up in a real "Little House on the Prairie" in northwestern South Dakota. She lived in Yankton many years near where my father lived when he was assigned there. Brokaw calls that his home, where he met his wife and returns

often. He also spent time in western South Dakota near Edgemont. His mother died about 10 days before I met with Tom here, and he plans to return to South Dakota for services and burial. His mom spent the last few years of her life in California, but South Dakota will always be home.

At the press conference here, he spent at least half an hour talking about South Dakota. In the evening performance at the Hult Center, a large concert hall, the 2,450 seats were sold out. He took the part of the much loved Abraham Lincoln where he compared him to today's crop of candidates who appear as gofor-the-jugular bloggers in their vitriolic attacks.

He compared the experience of WWII with our present-day wars, "Where we ask less than one percent of our population to do the fight-ing." In WWII most of the nation shared the burden. Tom Brokaw has taken a firm stance in support of those who made the sacrifice in that great world war. He said, "All Americans have to think of re-enlisting as citizens.'

We, as native South Dakotans, can be proud of Brokaw, 71, a native, who developed into one of the world's greatest minds.

### YMS Knowledge Team Competes Nationally

The Yankton Middle School Knowledge Master team and other middle school teams from South Dakota and the United States participated in the Knowledge Master Öpen on Dec. 7, 2011. This is a nationwide contest designed to measure the students' academic knowledge. The Yankton team finished 262nd among the 545 middle schools in the United States that chose to enter the contest.

A company named Academic Hallmarks provides the questions used in the contest. The questions are selected from all middle school academic areas and are designed to stimulate enthusiasm for learning and recognition for academic accomplishment. The contest runs on classroom computers to allow all students the opportunity to compete in a large academic event without the expense of traveling to a central site. An emphasis is placed on speed as well as accuracy in answering the 200 test questions. The coded test results are phoned into Academic Hallmarks and the company tabulates the results to determine the state and national winners.
