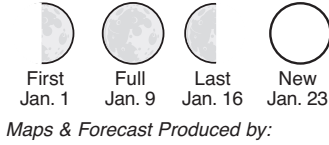

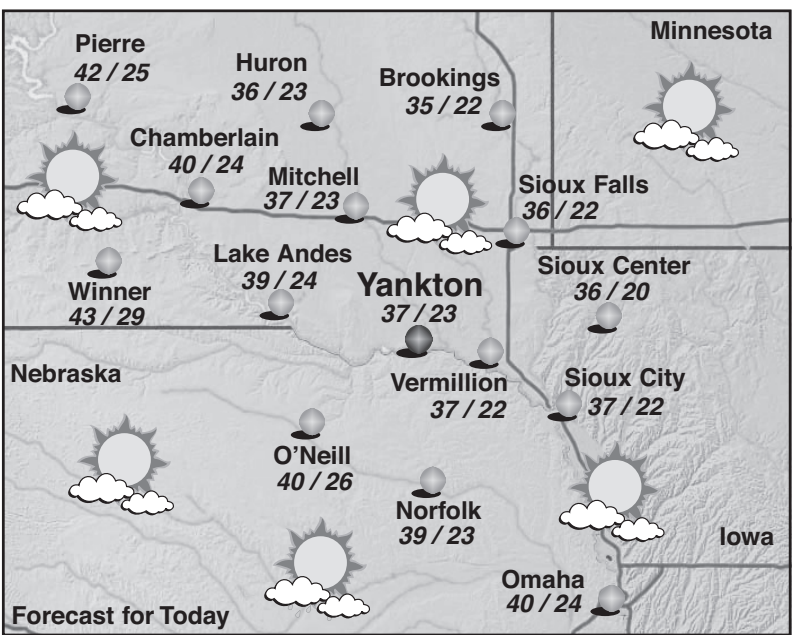

over the EMS. After debating the issue sporadically for more than a year, the commission ultimately decided with a 4-1 vote in January 2005 to keep Edinger as the medical director. Jensen voted with the majority. "I didn't know the whole picture," he said. "Most of the EMS patients end up at the hospital, but we were told that we had to be careful so that Avera didn't have total control. I was under that premise." Edinger held the medical directorship until earlier this year. "After almost 13 years, Darla decided to resign," said Steve Hawkins, who is now the county's ambulance administrator. "She was just ready to move on after 13 years of service to the community. She did an outstanding job." It was then that talks began with ASHH to appoint an interim director while a full-time replacement was found. Hiltunen

stepped forward as an interested candidate. "It was a simple solution and an easy transition," Hawkins said. "All the medics knew the physicians (at ASHH). When Doug (Ekeren, vice president of planning and development at ASHH) approached us about Dr. Hiltunen being interested, we were all very pleased." In November, the County Commission entered an agreement with Hiltunen to be the new medical director on a permanent basis. He will be paid \$1,500 per month. "I like the idea that it is a local doctor," said Commissioner Allen Sinclair, who had voted to retain Edinger in 2005, during that November meeting. "I think that is a positive step." Hawkins said there are some advantages to having a local physician in the role. Although Edinger came to Yankton once a month, it will now be easier to meet face to face to discuss issues and do quality assurance, he explained. However, he had no complaints about the way Edinger conducted herself as medical director.

"We went from one good medical director to another," Hawkins said. Doug Ekeren said ASHH was glad to be able to assist the county. "I think when this discussion took place several years ago, there was a strong desire on the part of the physicians on the Avera Sacred Heart medical staff to have a local medical director who had ties to the hospital, knew the hospital's protocols and could work to enhance communication with the Yankton County EMS," he said. "I don't think that's changed. "They believe having that local connection enhances the communication," Ekeren continued. "Any time there is better communication and you've got agreement on clinical protocols, that's better care for the patient. Those are the two things our physicians said are important. We think Dr. Hiltunen will help build better relationships." Most Yankton County EMS runs end up at ASHH, and better communication between the two entities will lead to more understanding of treatment protocols, he said. "The concern that our physicians stated was, there wasn't

that dialogue about what was happening in Yankton County EMS and what was happening in our emergency department on treatment protocols," Ekeren stated. "Now, we can ensure that those discussions do take place and, where there are variations in practice, they can be talked about and agreement reached between the medical director, who knows what the protocols are in the hospital, and Yankton County EMS and what we can do to get the best possible outcome for the patient." And, for good measure, Ekeren added that ASHH has no intention of attempting to take over operation of the EMS. Jensen said he is happy with the new direction. "The attitude was different back (in 2004-05)," he stated. "There was an animosity by some toward the hospital, and they were afraid the hospital was going to try to take control of the EMS. It was a learning curve for us. Over the years, I can see how that perception has changed. We've got to do better and work together."
