Lapsit is an interactive program for infants birth through 12 months and their parent or caregiver. Infants sit on the lap of or on the floor with their adult. Programs run approximately 20 minutes. Lapsits typically incorporate rhymes, songs, finger plays, board books and shakers. The library staff guides parents/caregivers in one-on-one interactions with their baby that stimulate brain development while strengthening bonding.

S.D. Unveils New Lobbyist Registration System

PIERRE — Secretary of State Jason Gant has unveiled the new online lobbyist registration and reporting system to all of South Dakota.

"I am very pleased at the progress we continue to make in transforming the office," Gant said. "With our new "EZ Lobby system, lobbyists and their employers will be able to register for the 2012 session and complete their registration payments on-line. There are other new capabilities being added that will improve the ability of citizens to review lobbyist expense reports.

'Moving from paper forms to compiling the information electronically will not only save tax dollars, but it's a key part of our 'open drawer policy,' as we continue to move paper documentation to the

Gant noted, "The on-line registration is also paired with regulatory changes meant to reform practices that had been in place for decades, while not increasing the lobbyist registration fee.

'The EZ Lobby system joins our recently unveiled on-line campaign finance system, as well as the conversion of our corporate annual report filing system to an on-line system. All of these actions have helped my office to save taxpayer dollars, both in the immediate short term by reducing our postage expenses, as well as by reducing our long term expenses in record storage, and other factors," Gant said. "The best part is we are only getting started."

Quitting Smoking A Good New Year's Resolution

LINCOLN, Neb. — At the top of the list for New Year's resolutions, many smokers make quitting their goal for the year.

In Nebraska, 18.4 percent of adults are smokers. But state statistics show that people with mental illnesses smoke at rates twice as high as the general population (41 percent).

"People with mental illnesses and substance use disorders die about 25 years earlier than the general population," said Scot Adams, director of Behavioral Health at the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services. "Smoking is the leading cause of

preventable death in the U.S."


"Smoking can cause lung and other cancers, cardiovascular disease, and respiratory diseases, like bronchitis and emphysema, among other conditions," said Dr. Joann Schaefer, the state's chief medical officer. "In Nebraska each year, more than 2,200 adults die prematurely because of cigarette smoking.

Nearly half of the cigarettes smoked annually in the U.S. (44 to 46 percent) are consumed by people with co-occurring psychiatric or addictive disorders. The smoking prevalence rates are even higher (60 to 80 percent) for those who are diagnosed with depression, bipolar disorder, or schizophrenia.

Smokers who are trying to quit can get support from the DHHS Nebraska Tobacco Quitline, 1-800-QUIT-NOW (1-800-784-8669).

imately \$174,000 annually for the shop project by using a propertytax opt-out authorization that has not yet expired. Because the Yankton County Government Center was paid off early, the commission has existing authorization for a maximum annual property tax opt-out of \$300,000.

Besides work that needs to be done on roads and bridges,

Jensen said the shop project will be the last of the major building projects of the county for the time being.

'As we look at the infrastructure in Yankton County, we're in pretty good shape for many, many years to come," he said. "The important thing now is to maintain and take care of what we've got.'

Also Friday, the commission was informed by Sheriff Jim Vlahakis that the county has received a \$28,900 Homeland Security grant to update the personal protection alarms throughout the Yankton County

Courthouse and Safety Center. The current system does not indicate exactly where the alarm has been activated, while the update will make that possible. Vlahakis also told the commis-

sion that the South Dakota Attorney General's Office has awarded Yankton County, as well as some other counties, a grant for 2012 to pay for a part-time 24/7 Program coordinator. He said it will take pressure off jail employees in mid-level counties that have sizable numbers of people participating on a daily basis but aren't making a lot of revenue to hire extra help.
