Monday, December 3, 1962

Thursday, December 3, 1987

Old Highway 50 To Have One-Way Traffic

In order to accommodate work being done in the channel, the James River bridge along Old Highway 50 is expected to be restricted to one-lane traffic during the day from Tuesday, Dec. 4, to Friday, Dec. 7.

Yankton County has hired Feimer Construction to place approximately 1,500 tons of Class C riprap along the river bank.

One-lane traffic will be in effect from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. each day. A flagger will be present at each end of bridge to stop traffic as necessary.

Two-way traffic will be restored overnight from 4 p.m. until 9 a.m. the next morning.
