Iowa Regents Head Blasts U. Iowa For 'Breakdowns'

IOWA CITY, Iowa (AP) - Iowa Board of Regents President Craig Lang says the University of Iowa is not doing enough to protect students and employees from sexual misconduct in light of the resignation of a former athletics department counselor.

Lang said Wednesday during a board meeting that the regents overhauled campus policies after a high-profile assault case involving lowa football players in 2007. Lang said one change required employees to participate in sexual misconduct training, and lowa's handling of the Peter Gray case shows the school "is not doing a good enough job in this area."

Lang says he expects the university will address "the obvious breakdowns" the case exposed.

Gray resigned last month after he was accused of improperly touching athletes for years, conduct that allegedly dated back to the 1990s.
