WATERTOWN — The Yankton Gazelles fought back from a 20-7 deficit, but ran out of gas down the stretch as Watertown beat Yankton 34-28 in Eastern South Dakota Conference girls' basketball action on Friday at the Watertown Civic Arena.

Watertown held the Gazelles to seven points through the first two and a half quarters before Yankton went on a 13-0 run to tie the game early in the fourth quarter. Yankton took a 27-26 lead before the Arrows took control down the stretch.

"Watertown is an older, more physical squad and, for two and a half quarters, they pushed us around," said Yankton head coach Doug Pesicka. "I take my hat off to our kids. They were able to battle back and take a lead.

"To me, that's a positive sign." Ashtin McClemans and Mandy Tetzlaff each had eight points for Watertown. Tetzlaff also had five rebounds.

For Yankton, Kelsey Fitzgerald led the way with 13 points and seven rebounds. Morgan Tessier had seven points and seven rebounds.

Yankton will look for its first victory of the season on Tuesday at home, facing a veteran Sioux Falls Washington club. For the Gazelles, who due to injury have one player who saw significant playing time a year ago in the rotation, growth cannot be assessed solely on wins and losses.

"We know we're a work in progress," Pesicka said. "We've told our players that how we are going to guage our success is on how much we improve

If there were questions coming into the new season for the Yankton Bucks basketball team with a new starting lineup and a new coach, one key question was answered after the opener.

Where do the Bucks need to improve?

"At least we learned where we're at and where we need to get better," said first-year head coach Chris Haynes, whose newlook squad dropped a 63-35 contest to Watertown in Friday night's debut at the Summit Center.

"We've got a long way to go, that's for sure."

It figured to be anything but easy for the Bucks (0-1), who had to replace five starters. Between breaking in a new offense and working on the on-court chemistry at the same time, there were plenty of debuts to go around.

"The first one is always the most stressful," said junior Lan-don Breen, who led with 10 points, all after halftime. "You want to come out and play well, especially for your coach. It was nerve-wracking."

Watertown, on the other hand, had no such experience or offenence, on both ends," Haynes said. "We didn't get out on shooters, and Watertown did pretty much whatever it wanted.

A 20-4 run from 2:13 left in the second quarter to the 2:10 mark of the third quarter ballooned the Watertown lead to 26, and the Bucks never got it under 20.

Ryan Olson sank a threepointer at the third-quarter buzzer, but the 21-point deficit ul-timately proved too much to overcome — especially given the way the Arrows were shooting. "They were lights out shoot-

ing," Breen said. "I didn't think we played bad defense, but credit to them, they hit those shots and we didn't."

Brody Ries and Trever Jutting finished with nine points apiece for Watertown, which will take its hot three-point shooting to Aberdeen Central next Tuesday.

"I thought we took a few too many threes than I'd prefer," Norberg said. "We have to find more balance. Yankton did a good job taking away our inside, so that's something we have to work on."
