ance shows that USDA will work with school nutrition officials and others who have concerns.

"It takes time to work out the kinks," Wootan said. "This should show Congress that they don't need to interfere legislatively."

Congress has already interfered with the rules. Last year, after USDA first proposed the new guidelines, Congress prohibited USDA from limiting potatoes and French fries and allowed school lunchrooms to continue counting tomato paste on pizza as a vegetable.

The school lunch rules apply to federally subsidized lunches

served to low-income children. Those meals have always been subject to nutritional guidelines because they are partially paid for by the federal government, but the new rules put broader restrictions on what could be served as childhood obesity rates have skyrocketed.

School kids can still buy additional foods in other parts of the lunchroom and the school. Congress two years ago directed USDA to regulate those foods as well, but the department has yet to issue those rules.

Montana Sen. Jon Tester, a Democrat among the lawmakers who wrote to USDA about the rules, praised the move.

"Schools need flexibility to make sure kids get the nutrition they need to focus on their studies," he said.

while nearly 5 inches fell in La Crosse. It was the first snowfall greater than 2 inches that La Crosse had seen since Jan. 21.

The immediate Yankton area missed out on the snowiest part of the storm, as Yankton received just a trace of snow. However, Parkston received 3 inches and Armour recorded 2 inches. The area was also slapped with cold northern winds, sometimes clocking up to 40 mph, on Sunday, causing visibility issues in some open areas.

The Minnesota Department of Transportation reported difficult driving conditions across much of the southern two-thirds of the state, with no travel advised and several highways closed in west-central Minnesota and southwestern Minnesota. MnDOT spokesman Kevin Gutknecht said the agency pulled its plows off the roads in the Granite Falls, Madison, Marshall and Montevideo areas.

The Minnesota State Patrol reported about 300 crashes statewide from Saturday night through noon Sunday, with more than 30 involving injuries, but no fatalities. Lt. Eric Roeske also reported more than 300 spinouts or vehicles off the road.

Minneapolis, St. Paul, several

suburban communities and St. Cloud declared snow emergencies, meaning parking restrictions will be in effect until the streets are plowed.

Around 150 flights at Minneapolis-St. Paul International Airport were canceled due to the storm, airport spokesman Pat Hogan said, but he said crews were able to keep at least one runway open. Delta Air Lines, the airport's main carrier, said travelers through the Twin Cities and Duluth could rebook their flights without charge. The Federal Aviation Administration said the snow delayed some flights by an average of about 90 minutes.

In 1931, Japan launched an invasion into northern China, colonizing the area and displacing much of the native population.

In response, the U.S. condemned Japan publicly, but chose to seek out peaceful solutions.

"People were coming out of a very difficult time (with the Great Depression), and it seemed like an even more bitter pill to swallow that the United States would be plunging into another world war," Agostini said.

However, Japan continued its transformation into a military dictatorship, even assassinating opponents of the new government throughout the 1930s.

"There was a tremendous amount of political instability in Japan, so this was a country that was really heading for a great deal of trouble," Agostini said.

He said by the time Germany invaded Poland in 1939, Japan was looking to expand its possessions throughout Asia, including Singapore and Hong Kong.

"And with all the instability that had been created by the war in Europe, the Japanese saw an opening," he said.

By 1940, Japan had decided it wanted war with the United States, Agostini said.

"The Japanese strategy in thinking that they would defeat the United States was that they

would fight a war in the Pacific, and they would occupy as many islands they could in the Pacific," he said. "The American public would not want to go through another war, and the Japanese would be able to keep the possessions they had."

On Dec. 6, 1941, knowing the Japanese were about to attack, President Franklin Roosevelt sent a message to the Japanese emperor requesting a peaceful solution. However, the message arrived as the Japanese planes were in the air approaching Pearl Harbor.

"The way the war started was something that caused many Americans to be angered," Agostini said. "Not only were they attacking this nation that was trying to get itself out of the Great Depression, but they were attacking while they were projecting peace. They were attacking a nation that was doing everything it could to prevent a war in the Pacific."

He said that while Japan's attack was a tactical victory, the approach was flawed, and ultimately led to its failure.

"The country never appreciated that if you are trying to convince an enemy to fight a lengthy war and then negotiate a peace, you can't start a war that causes that nation to be filled with a great deal of resolve and anger," Agostini said. "And at Pearl Harbor, they had done just that."

gift cards, scammers will use the activation numbers on the back of the cards they obtained to make purchases online.

"The gift card has been loaded and unloaded before you've even gotten it as a gift," Schmidt said.

She said many retailers have attempted to counteract such scams by placing material over the activation numbers that must be peeled or scratched off before using. She advises buyers to look for such gift cards when buying off a large rack or, at the very least, to take cards from the back of the rack as opposed to the front.

An even better approach is to buy gift cards from specific retailers, Schmidt said.

"If you want a Starbucks gift card, go to Starbucks and buy one," she said. "It's convenient to buy them off the racks, but you have to be aware of the problems if you do."

Schmidt said consumers should also be careful when attempting to buy gift cards online. Scammers often sell fake cards or real cards with amounts different from what is advertised. To avoid this, buyers should avoid sites like Craigslist and only purchase from sites that specialize in buying and selling gift cards.

When in doubt, consumers can always buy from a trusted source, such as a school or a church involved in the Scrip fundraising program, Schmidt said.

"If you know the gift cards have been in the hands of people you know and trust, those are good places to buy them," she said.
