Later, as M returns from a meeting, the MI6 computer system is hacked and an explosion occurs in the offices of the building, which kills several MI6 employees.


Bond, previously presumed dead, hears of this incident and returns to London.



Though it Evolves, Journalism Remains of Critical Importance

In today's world full of advanced technology, where texting, Facebook, and Twitter are prominent sources of communication, some people wonder if print media, such as newspapers or books, are still an important mode of communication.

Journalism comes in many formats including newspapers, magazines, television, internet services, and photographs. Many people depend on journalism to get facts on daily events which happen in their community, country, or interna-

The key word here is "facts." Kevin Henseler, Yankton High School graduate and owner/ operator of the *Crofton Journal* in Crofton, Neb., says, "The biggest change I've seen deals with blogs and that kind of media. I feel like that form of journalism has lost a certain amount of objectivity. Instead of finding sources to back up a position, if reporters hear it, they put it out there. Even though I never took journalism from Mr. (Richard) Anderson, I know that's not how he taught his kids—he made certain they were accountable for their information."

Endless internet sites are available which provide a magnitude of data on any given topic, but one must be cautious about trusting data on unfamiliar sites.

Henseler believes some online writers may find it "supposedly easier to be anonymous," which

can result in facts being misconstrued. Within hardcopy print media, a protocol has traditionally existed which requires a journalist to back up facts, check sources, and undergo an editorial review in an attempt to present the most accurate, fair, and unbiased report possible.

Good journalists still practice this tradition, and Henseler states, "A lot of good writers and reporters, who learned from Mr. Anderson, are out in journalism."

Beyond reporting, even in the production process, Henseler notes temptations can present themselves. "I have heard of cases where, say

there's a place for a good picture, but in its original form, the people are walking off the page. Technology allows for a person to just flip the image, but is that cheating? Is it not telling the truth or bending what was real?"

An appealing aspect of modern-day technology is the ability to acquire information almost immediately after it happens; however, a hazard of this type of communication is that there is greater likelihood that facts may be misconstrued or blatantly wrong. One must use caution in trusting this information and be diligent in checking the

Though technology does present some challenges, journalism production has been greatly streamlined by technology's advancement.

Kathy Larson, Press & Dakotan Composing Manager, says, "Over 20 years ago, Compugraphic machines were used where you typed in the information in numerous point sizes, then cut everything apart and waxed everything together for both ads and news copy. Then, everything was waxed to paste on a page how you would see it, then shot to film from which a plate was made to go on the press. Now everything is done on the computer—from designing the ads to laying out the whole newspaper—and sent straight to press. "

Henseler also recalls the Compugraphic machine and explains, "It was huge—5 feet tall. We had it in the middle of a room and had to walk around it."

Henseler adds, "The production process was so labor intensive, we needed at least four people. Now, I sit at the computer and am able to do everything myself."

Whether information is conveyed with modern technology or with print media, journalism is an important part of our society. We depend on it in many ways, from keeping up with current trends to understanding world events.

All modes of journalism serve a role in our culture; however, each mode has its strengths and weaknesses.

The format of journalism will continue to change along with the rapid advances in our technology; its importance remains the same.
