Jitimately, my decision to go with Te'o over Manziel was about overall impact. While you expect a good quarterback to make opponents scheme against him, you don't necessarily expect that on the defensive end. Te'o, though, made that kind of impact on defense.

I will admit that I let Manziel's age play some factor in my decision, but I did not exclude him based on his being a freshman. I believe I would have put Manziel second even if he were an upperclassman

I would have liked to have put Nebraska running back Rex Burkhead on my ballot, but his injuries kept him from playing enough games for me to consider him a top-three guy.
