## Storm Brought Little Drought Relief To The Region, Climatologist Says

BROOKINGS — The weekend blizzard, which dropped between 5 and 10 inches of snow on much of eastern South Dakota won't have much of an impact on drought conditions in farm country, says Dennis Todey, State Climatologist.

"The blizzard will do very little for soil moisture because soils were frozen or near freezing prior to the storm," Todey said in a press release issued Monday. Some portions of the state received up to 10 inches

of snow from the storm, although the southeast corner of the state received very little snowfall. Because the snow from the weekend storm was

fairly liquid, Todey says when it does melt, it may contribute about 1 inch of soil moisture. With most of the snow falling in the eastern half of the state, Todey adds that central and western South Dakota farmers who planted winter wheat did not benefit from the storm.

In addition to visibility issues during the storm, Todey says the storm creates challenges for many cattle producers who will have to pull grazing cattle off corn and soybean fields and move snow out of feedlot

For personal safety, Todey encourages South Dakotans to watch the National Weather Service Web site, weather.gov or National Oceanic and Atmospheric

Gertsema, who has held the position for the past 22 years, announced last Friday his intentions to resign effective June 30, 2013.

Reflecting on his time at YSD, Gertsema said he was proud of his and the district's many accomplishments,

including the addition of facilities such as the YHS/Summit Activities Center, upgrades in technology to allow for better teaching and learning activities, the quality of the district's staff and, most of all, the level of student achievement.

"The thing that has really driven me, contrary to what some people may think, has always been the kids," he said. "Without the students here, we don't need to be here tonight.'

However, Gertsema said it is time for him to move

"I've got some other things I want to do with my life," he said. "I'm in my 60s now, and I do have a bucket list like probably everybody else. I'm also blessed with a great family and grandkids, and I'm looking forward to that. With that in mind, I appreciate the opportunity, and I told Chris today that I'm committed to working in this position and giving 110 percent through June.

During Monday night's meeting, the board also heard a budget report from Gertsema and YSD business manager Jason Bietz. The board had requested the report to discuss state aid revenue projections for upcoming years following Gov. Dennis Daugaard's Dec. 4 proposal for the state budget.

Bietz said that, despite including a 3 percent increase for education funding, Daugaard's budget proposal will not provide enough funding to make up for past cuts in the budget, most notably the 8.6 percent cut in funding by the state Legislature in 2011. He said that Yankton is currently receiving almost \$2 million less from the state than four years ago, and

### **City Studies** Resource Officer For **Schools**

After hearing that Yankton is the only school district of its size in the state without a school resource officer, the City Commission decided Monday to allow the police department to pursue fund-

ing for such a position. Yankton Police Chief Brian Paulsen said his department has been involved in discussions for approximately a year with the Yankton School District and Lewis and Clark Behavioral Health about the need for a school resource offi-

"From those initial conversations, the high school hired their substance abuse counselor that started in August," he stated.

However, it has been a struggle to find funding for a school resource officer.

Paulsen said that may change

## **Yankton River Events To Mark Milestones In 2013**

The three Missouri River events at Yankton are marking major milestones next spring, led by the river clean-up's 10th an-

In addition, major plans are in the works for the education festival, which looks to set a new record with more than 500 students. and the Clean Boat Event which has kept invasive species out of Lewis and Clark Lake.

The organizing committee met Monday, showing excitement for all three events as they prepare for the final push in the coming

Last spring's river clean-up collected about 3.5 tons of debris, which likely set a record for the event, said Ranger Dugan Smith with the National Park Service (NPS).

We expected more garbage after the flood in 2011. But even in the six years before that,

we were getting at least a couple of tons each year and were averaging about three tons a year," he said.

"If you add all the stuff over the last 10 years, that's a lot of garbage, and it's still being collected."

The Missouri River Watershed Education Festival has quadrupled in four years, from about 100 students the first year to 425 last year, said Mary Robb with the City of Yankton.

"And Vermillion wasn't able to attend last year. If they return next year, we may be looking at 525 students," she said. "We have gone with two stations for many of the presentations, so the groups don't get too large.'

Meanwhile, the Clean Boat Event has been successful in what it has kept away - invasive species that latch onto boats and equipment to find their way into new waterways.

"The goal, when we started, was to raise
