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Herbster's Calendar Quickly Filling Up

Abbott: Herbster Will Be Interim AD At Least Through June

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VERMILLION — As if it wasn't planning to be anyway, the calendar in David Herbster's phone for the winter and spring months is quickly filling up.

Herbster's trial run as interim athletic director at the University of South Dakota will last at least through June 2013, president Jim Abbott said in an interview this week with the Press &

Any decision on the future of that position — and more accurately, Herbster's future — will not be made until after that six-month period following last week's sudden resignation of athletic director David Sayler, Abbott said.

"I'm not going to think much beyond what I told Herbster," he said Monday. "He is interim for a max of six months. Then at some point he and I will sit down together and talk about how things are going, and I'll make a decision about how to move forward.'

Moving forward is the only thing USD can do at this point, following Sayler's departure for the same position at Miami University in Ohio. There's enough on the immediate horizon to keep the focus to the future, Herbster

"That's the thing, there's no choice," he said this week. "Things like this occur in athletics, you have to keep going. It's a lot like a football game. If you lose your quarterback, you put the next guy in and run your plays.

"You pick up the slack and you go." Of course, in Sayler's case, it wasn't an injury but family concerns that ultimately led to his exit for Ohio.

Saying that was not "entirely surprised" by the move because of Sayler's family issues (mother-in-law recently died), Abbott did say the sudden resignation caught him off guard.

"There are family reasons that were important to him, and I understand that; family reasons ought to trump other things," Abbott said. "It doesn't make it

any less disappointing to us here at USD, but the good thing is, we have in David Herbster a very capable individual."
In his sixth year at USD, Herbster —

previously the senior associate A.D. for external relations — said that while, yes, he would be interested in staying on a permanent capacity, he has to be most concerned with day-to-day operations.

"I just know that we'll need to address some things," Herbster said. "We'll play a man down here for a while, but six months, we can make it work.

The biggest issue on Herbster's plate, of course, is the ongoing fundraising for the \$48 million volleyball/basketball arena and an outdoor track/soccer complex project — to be funded solely through gifts.

There remains approximately \$10 million "in the pipeline that we have to go finalize," said Herbster, who also said one of the top goals is to keep the momentum for the projects moving for-

Referencing himself, Sayler, Herbster

and USD Foundation president Steve Brown as the top fundraisers, Abbott said, "There were four of us, now there are three.

"We'll just have to work even harder to make the arena a reality," the president added. "I have confidence that we'll be able to do that."

To help compensate for the loss of Sayler, the USD athletic department will redistribute assignments and shift staff were needed, Herbster said, specifically to ensure that the interim A.D. is "out on the road a lot more."

"The good thing is, we have a great list of potential donors to work from," Herbster said. "You can't throw that list

As Abbott pointed out, it's not always just as simple as meeting with donors and getting their signature on a piece of

"We've had people who have committed but have not signed on the dotted line, and some who have signed," said Abbott, who referenced the 'fiscal cliff' as a possible concern for interested

"In the end, we'll have a new arena." There are also issues Herbster will have to deal with in the next six months, as well. The DakotaDome will host the Summit League Indoor Track Championships Feb. 24-25, and USD will compete for the first time in the Summit League Basketball Championships,

March 9-12, in Sioux Falls. "There's going to be no grass growing under these feet," Herbster said.

Coyote coaches, athletes and other athletic department staff members have, since last Thursday's announcement that Sayler was leaving, expressed their support of Herbster.

President Abbott's assurance means a lot, but when you get it from the coaches and the students, that's when it feels the best," Herbster said. "They are the ones you work with on a daily basis; the ones you spend most of your time

USD Powers Past Morehead State

Myles Scores Career-High 32 Points As Coyotes Win 85-75

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VERMILLION — Running down the court was clearly a painful task for Juevol Myles.

Standing at the free throw line, with limited motion, on the other hand, was not much of a problem. Nor has it been, injury or otherwise, this season for the University of South Dakota senior point guard.

A game-time decision because of a bruised tailbone, Myles not only played but scored 32 points as the Coyote men set a new school record for made free throws in an 85-75 victory Wednesday night over Morehead State at the DakotaDome.

'Coach preaches that free throws can win games," said Myles, who was 15-of-16 at the foul line for the second straight

"It doesn't matter, from the 12th man to the first man, we go to the line, clear our minds and knock down free throws.

There were plenty of those attempts for the Coyotes (5-7) against the nation's leader in fouls committed. USD, which ranks ninth nationally in that category, was 43-of-50 at the charity stripe, eclipsing the previous

Myles, who injured his tailbone after landing on it awkwardly against Ball State last Saturday, led an aggressive USD offense that continually got to the rim early and took advantage of 32 Morehead State fouls.

"He's a tough kid, he played on a lot of mental toughness tonight, in pain," USD coach Dave Boots said. "I'm very impressed that he had that much toughness to play at that high level."

Facing an aggressive defense with four starting guards, the Coyotes struggled early against that pressure but led for the final 30 minutes.

"We watched film on them, they like to play 10 to 12 guys and run around," Myles said. "We imitated that in practice. We came out and handled that pressure well.

As expected, fouls were an early concern for Morehead State - whistled for 17, in fact — and a boon for the Coyotes.

Though it made just eight baskets, USD was 22-of-26 at the free throw line in a first half that took

A 17-3 spurt from an eightpoint deficit to up 25-19 at the 7:14 mark helped spurn the Coyotes to a 40-31 halftime lead.

USD led for the entire second half, by as many as 10 points (the latest with 8:32 to play), despite the visiting Eagles draining nine 3's after halftime. Then, of course, came the pressure.

"They press and play a lot of guys. Fouls are not really a factor for them," Boots said. "It wasn't anything we weren't ready for."

Morehead State — of the Ohio Valley Conference — got as close as 73-67 with 3:45 remaining, but every time it hit a shot, the Coyotes had an answer. Fittingly, Myles, an 89-percent

free throw shooter, was responsible for breaking the school record. His foul shot with 45 seconds left proved to be the mark. The key to such success at the

foul line? "In practice, we just hack each other all day and get to the free throw line," said junior Karim Rowson, who added 17 points on an 11-of-14 effort at the stripe. "We beat each other up; every day we're always at the line."

Brandon Bos added 12 points and six rebounds, and Steve Tecker chipped in with 11 points and six rebounds off the bench for the Coyotes, who next play at Green Bay on Saturday.

Green Bay (4-7), of the Horizon League, beat Big East Conference member Marquette 49-47 on Wednesday night. The Phoenix are led by 7-foot-1 center Alec Brown, whom Boots called an NBA prospect.

"Our schedule's been incredibly good," Boots said. "Ball State is from a very good league. We just haven't had any easy ones. And that's not going to change."

"The integrity of the process and our continued full cooperation with the NCAA prohibits us from publicly

discussing the specifics of this matter," Oregon said in

a statement Wednesday night.

Andersen Changes Directions, Heads To Wisconsin

Gary Andersen publicly pledged his allegiance to Utah State not long ago. Now he's on the verge of becoming Wisconsin's coach.

Wisconsin reportedly will hire Andersen to replace Bret Bielema, who left the Badgers earlier this month to take the Arkansas job.

The news about Andersen broke Tuesday night and neither Utah State nor Wisconsin had anything official to announce about Andersen on Wednesday. The delay is at least in part tied to laws in Wisconsin that require a state job to be posted for at least two weeks before it can be filled. The two-week posting was up at the end of business on Wednesday.

The school was expected to introduce Andersen at a news conference Thursday, but a snowstorm might change those plans.

The 48-year-old Andersen just completed his fourth and best season at Utah State. The 18th-ranked Aggies finished 11-2 with a bowl victory against Toledo and won the Western Athletic Conference.

It's been a remarkable rise for a program that had been near the bottom of major college football for years, and stuck in distant third in its own state behind BYU and Utah. The Aggies won nine games in the previous four seasons before Andersen took over. The last football coach to finish his tenure in Logan, Utah, with a winning record was Phil Krueger who went 21-12 from

Andersen drew interest from California, Colorado and Kentucky last month, but decided to pass on those opportunities and received a contract extension from Utah State. That was before Wisconsin had

an opening. Bielema announced he was leaving on Dec. 4, three days after the Badgers won their third straight Big Ten title and trip to the Rose Bowl. As late as last week, before Utah

State played in the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl, Andersen was saying he was committed to the Aggies.

"I love the kids I get to coach here. ... The kids I have in the program, it just was not time. I look them in the eye and I need to be where I'm at," he told the Idaho Statesman newspaper.

Noack Powers Belmont Past South Dakota State

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Trevor Noack scored a careerhigh 24 points and Blake Jenkins turned in his first double-double of the year as Belmont topped South Dakota State 76-49 Wednesday night in a nonconfer-
