2013 One Book One Nebraska Announced

LINCOLN, Neb. — "O Pioneers!" by Willa Cather is Nebraska's reading choice for the 2013 One Book One Nebraska statewide reading pro-

Cather's "O Pioneers!" is the story of the Bergsons, a family of Swedish pioneers that settles on the American prairie. While Alexandra, the family matriarch, turns the family farm into a financial success, her brother Emil struggles. A novel surprisingly ahead of its time, this work touches on a wide range of enduring themes—love, marriage, temptation, and isolation.

The One Book One Nebraska reading program, sponsored by the Nebraska Center for the Book, is now in its ninth year. It encourages Nebraskans across the state to read and discuss one book, chosen from books written by Nebraska authors or that have a Nebraska theme or setting. A committee of the Nebraska Center for the Book selected the finalists from a list of twelve titles nominated by sixty Nebraskans from across the state. The Nebraska Center for the Book board announced the choice for the 2013 One Book One Nebraska at the Celebration of Nebraska Books on November 3 in Lincoln.

Libraries across Nebraska will join the Willa Cather Foundation, Nebraska Center for the Book, and other literary and cultural organizations in planning book discussions, activities, and events that will encourage Nebraskans to read and discuss this book. 'Lost Gift' Is Great Holiday Find

This Christmas, you'll find lots of surprises beneath your tree.

Some of them, of course, will arrive from Santa. Others will come in the mail from Grandma or a favorite aunt who lives far away. Then there are the beribboned packages that somehow manage to sneak under the tree, courtesy of someone special.

Emerson Johansson never expected a gift, especially not something sent decades ago. But in the new book "The Lost Christmas Gift" by Andrew Beckham, he received a box full of memories...

Two days before Christmas, a box arrived at Emerson Johansson's house. It was wrapped in paper that was old and fragile, and he was surprised to see his father's handwriting on the outside.

His dad had been dead for years. During World War II, Emerson's father worked as a cartographer in France and, judging by the postmarks, Emerson knew that that was where the box had come from, some 70-odd years ago. Exhibit Opens At USD's Day Gallery

VERMILLION — "Picturing Native: Photographs from Edward Curtis, Horace Poolaw and Zig Jackson" will be on display at the University of South Dakota at the John. A. Ďay Gallery in the Warren M. Lee Center for Fine Arts.

In addition to the exhibition, which runs through Wednesday, Jan. 30, "Picturing Native" will include campus lectures from Jackson and Linda Poolaw, daughter of Horace Poolaw, along with a reception honoring them from 5-7:30 p.m. on Friday, Jan. 25 at the Day Gallery. Jackson will be on campus to talk about contemporary photography at 3 p.m. on Thursday, Jan. 24, in the Day Gallery while Linda Poolaw will

discuss her father's photographic work at 3 p.m. on Friday, Jan. 25 in the John A. Day Gallery. The artist lectures, exhibition and reception are all free and open to the public.

"Picturing Native" features the relationship between the photographic medium and the portrayal of American Indian subjects in the past 100 years. The exhibition will feature a small selection of photogravures by Edward Curtis from his publication, "The North American Indian (1907-1930)." This extensive publication, comprised of 10 portfolios and nearly 700 plates, are on loan from the University Libraries Archives and Special Collections at USD. In addition to the photogravures, the

exhibition will feature work by Horace Poolaw (Kiowa), who photographed his family and their daily lives in Oklahoma during a transitional period of assimilation from the 1930s through the 1950s. The exhibition will also showcase the contemporary photography of Jackson (Mandan, Hidatsa, Arikara). Jackson's photographs tackle Native American needs and problems, including poverty, alcoholism and suicide.

Gallery hours are 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday, and on the weekends by appointment. University Art Galleries will be closed Dec. 24-25 and Jan. 1, 2013.

New Year's Eve Party At The Center


The Center, 900 Whiting Drive, Yankton, will host a New Year's Eve Party on Monday, Dec. 31, running from 7-10 p.m.
